Chantel reported that we are on track to spend the \$2.5m over the last 5 years after spending about \$500,000 annually on facilities. We will move some money from bottom line to support facilities needs and some of the deferred maintenance that we have had before. If a new Measure were not to pass in 2024, we will have a \$1.4m deficit. We will hopefully take a new Measure A to voters in 2023.

Damon Hill reported on expenditures to date, repairs to Novato Library roof for the next three years should be \$35,000; the second major project is the Corte Madera Roof – just finished a strong patching project & we are also going to do a \$27,000 repair to this roof in December, which should secure it for this rainy season. We have budgeted around \$400,000 for a roof replacement for the Corte Madera roof. Fire Suppression Systems will be installed in the Novato and the Corte Madera branches (they are estimated to cost \$350,000 and \$300,000). These will go out for bid soon with the hopes of installing in the spring of 2020. We installed an electric charging station for the Learning Bus at Los Gamos, which cost \$23,000. We have dedicated \$25,000 to hire an architect to design the Fairfax Garden.

Civic Center

Teressa explains one day's experiences:

In the morning, a young patron, maybe 3-4 years old, was returning books through the book drop and peered in, looking around. Anne and I were in the room and we said, hello. He returned a book "Four Legs Bad, Two Legs Good," and said that it was his favorite. I got curious and opened the book to take a look. "Great pictures" I said. And then I started to read the story. As I was reading, our young patron filled in the words at the end of each bit and we started to read together. It was great fun for all of us. I asked, should I check the book in so he could have it again and the answer was a resounding "YES!" And off he went with his mom to pick out some more books to take home.

In the afternoon, a gentleman came in with his wife and (I assume) adult son. He asked did we have the 1928 National Geographic. Which month, I asked. He said it wasn't for a particular article, but rather an advertisement he was looking for. I wasn't sure if we had any that far back in the perimeter, but said I'll take a look and see what we have. We didn't have any way back issues of National Geographic, but we did have older issues of Life Magazine. I brought out one of the binders for 1937. We got the gentleman and his wife settled at a table so they could look. It turns out that he was born in 1924. It wasn't clear if he wanted magazines from that year or 1928, but either way, they were happy to look at the Life Magazines. They stayed for a long while looking at the magazines. I happened to run into them as they were leaving. The wife (herself, about 90) thanked me and said that was really good. Her husband has dementia and they brought him here for an afternoon outing. She said she'd like to come back by herself to look some more at the magazines.

Anyway, those two bookend patron experiences speak volumes for the role the library plays in the lives of people of all ages. I know so much is online, but if it weren't for the physical materials we provide, meaningful exchanges like these would not happen.

Kathleen updated all picture book lading graphics for CCE with images in alignment with our equity and diversity goals, and with intent towards adult users who may not read, adult and youth who may not speak English, children who may be on the spectrum, and with a intent towards children's ability to independently pathfind. The glade names are now in both English and Spanish, and thanks to Victor Avalos translating the glade descriptions, the bookmark pathfinders explain the glades will be bilingual as well.

Kathleen shifted major portions of the picture book and folk and fairy tale collection to make a more suitable space for the Parent's Shelf books, the Bilingual collection and to begin initial brainstorming of where to shelve the "Conscious Kid's Kits" which will arrive soon. These hanging bag kits hold 5 to 6 books targeted to adults to begin talking with children about race.

Support **youth** in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.

Civic Center

Natalie co-facilitated with Marin City branch Manager Diana Lopez a discussion of the Marin Community Read title *High* by Nic and David Sheff. Students watched clips from the Dominican University talk with Nic and David Sheff, as well as Nic Sheff's 2009 presentation at the Branson School. They discussed the role of family history and genetics, stresses and pressures faced by young people that contribute to drug use, coping mechanisms, and the importance of sharing our stories with each other. They also discussed racial inequity of access to preventative medicine and mental health services, as well as racial disparities in drug arrests. Youth, staff, and librarians alike shared stories and it was a powerful conversation.

Natalie attended the second meeting of the County Prevention and Early Intervention Collaboration Committee: The goal of the Collaboration is to identify, organize, and provide accessible information on programs and services to children and families in Marin, specifically targeting youth who are considered at-risk of entering the juvenile justice system. This resource would be available to County staff, law enforcement, school personnel, and local partners engaged with assisting youth. The committee is starting by cataloging County provided/funded programs. This is a valuable opportunity to make our resources more visible and accessible, and to identify gaps in service to our communities

In response to a patron bringing in a large donation of eyeglasses for the Lions Club and our donation box being full, Linda contacted the Lions Club. However, the person handling the box died two years ago. Linda emailed another Las Gallinas Lions Club member and took the donation to his home. Linda asked if the Lions still want our donations which they absolutely still do as they send the glasses to a prison in California. The glasses are repaired, the prescription is analyzed, and they are readied for re-use. In January 2020, the Lions plan to take 10,000 pair of glasses to Mexico.

November 18th brought a record crowd to historian Mike Moyle's compelling talk on the history of local dairy ranching. Benefactor Jeff Craemer's recent gift of a high-definition projector was timely in that we were able to display the presentation in a much larger format to the 100+ attendees. Among the audience were descendants of some of the original owners of the dairy ranches and their participation greatly enhanced the event. Over the past year, local historians Mike Moyle, with help from our own Dewey Livingston, set out to identify the sites of every dairy that ever operated in Marin. They found more than 330. During the presentation, Mike shared with us the results of this effort, with a particular focus on the cluster of thirteen dairies in northern San Rafael that were all within a mile or two of the California Room's Map & Special Collections Facility. As an additional bonus, Mike contributed his source materials & PowerPoint so we could host them on our digital archive. This month digital Archivist Carol Acquaviva added is a small but compelling series documenting the incipient development of <u>Almonte</u> (near Tam Junction) from a collection of glass plate negatives recently donated by Jeff Craemer. Thanks to information provided by the local history community – in particular Parker Pringle- we've been able to add very specific captions to the images.

Carol has also added a super fun collection of mid-20th century *Cartoon-O-Maps* of Marin by graphic designer Ted Hubbard. Ted's maps aimed to promote the merchants and civic services in various parts of Marin County. Highlighted are local businesses: restaurants, dry cleaners, auto shops, boutiques, real estate offices, home goods, and grocers; plus schools, churches, and community organizations. These creative maps highlight the booming development of post-World War II Marin.

Our talented volunteer Dayle Reilly has added 30 more oral history <u>interviews</u> to our online collection; we now have 164 interviews for patrons to explore.

She was telling me about how she just lost her job and she is using the library more often now for job searching and using our digital resources. She was thrilled with how many resources we have for her to use during her job search. She also expressed how happy she was with the overall way libraries seem to be heading...we are more open, friendly, and accessible than ever - I completely agree!

Recently we've also had the opportunity to make life easier for some stressed out patrons needing to have some documents printed. Our library mobile printing feature, which allows people to send print jobs wirelessly to the printers in the library from smartphones, tablets, and laptops, is a big hit when people hit a snag like running out of ink, or lacking a printer altogether.

Just a couple of examples: one woman needed to print copies of her pay stubs from a website and she needed them right away. She tried to send them from her smartphone, but it was a bit overwhelming, so she came in to the branch and we were able to help her navigate the app and walk away a few minutes later with what she needed. Then, a college student who was frustrated dealing with documentation needed for a course, wanted to print off a certificate for a training she had done from her laptop, and we were able to help her be successful with that task, as well!

April Hayley, Adult/Teen Services Librarian II, met with the Teen Book Club on November 19 to talk about "The Hate U Give." She was concerned that because it was a minimum day kids would not show up for the program. Instead, she found that the group who've been attending all decided to have lunch together and then hang out until the program started. They enjoyed talking about the book, and wanted to learn more about Black Lives Matter. April worked with them to chart what they have learned and what else they'd like to know. This group of teens has been very engaged in reading books with social justice themes.

April partnered with SURJ-Marin for "Justice is Not Colorblind," a Film & Conversation program November 2 that followed up on the issues raised at the previous program. She invited Don Carney, Director of Restorative Justice and Youth Court, and two youth advocates. Her report states "We set out to highlight the fact that Youth Court (the only restorative justice program for youth who commit infractions like Marijuana possession in Marin County) is not equally available to all teens in Marin. The Marin Sheriff Department, which has jurisdiction over Marin City, the only the majority African American community in Marin, does not refer cases to Youth Court, and therefore African American teens who break the law are often excluded from accessing the program. While fifteen percent of juveniles are arrested in Marin County are African American, only one percent of these offenders are referred to Youth Court. We invited teen Youth Court volunteers to speak about this issue with the hope that participants could work together to plan ways to alleviate the current disproportionalities." The audience decided they would form a task force to tackle the failings of a recent Grand Jury report. This program, in addition to being educational for attendees, offered teens an opportunity to speak up.





Marin County Libraries Respond!

Communities and libraries connected to work together during the power outage and Kincaid Fire. MCFL staff and our community came together to be of service during the PG&E power outage and the Kincaid Fire. Terry Jones', our Bookmobile Program Coordinator spent her last official days before retirement serving the evacuees at the Marin Center. In fact, we had a small celebration in her honor and shared cake and pizza with them! That's just one example of dozens where the commitment, tremendous flexibility and adaptability of your library system served our communities as we all dealt with the power outages, the fire and the evacuations.

We deployed the old FLAGship bus over several days with Marin City staff as a comfort station not only providing charging of devices, Internet access, water but also books and game. One patron called us the VIP comfort station! In addition to the Bookmobile we took the Learning Bus to the evacuee center and provided books, games, soccer balls and just a place to chill for families spending many days there in cramped conditions and uncertainty about whether they would have homes to return to. Nearly all staff in the system lost power at their homes. For several of our working days we had no power at any facility, but as always library staff stepped up and did what they could to assist our communities- opening as soon as they could to serve them. We learned a lot in this event and hopefully if or when it happens again we will be even more prepared.
