Though David continues to host his own sophisticated <a href="site">site</a>, his priceless collection of maps is now the centerpiece of <a href="Stanford University's David Rumsey Map Center">Stanford University's David Rumsey Map Center</a>. David & Emily spent over two hours touring our map collection and examining items in our unique unrecorded Marin County Map & Survey collection. We exchanged ideas on digitization and metadata protocols, geo-referencing & other topics of mutual interest. David agreed to discuss options for georeferencing with one of our volunteers -Parker Pringle- and the California Room plans to engage in a pilot to geo-reference a subset of our map and aerial photograph collections. We have also been invited to tour the David Rumsey Map Center at Stanford.

They were very helpful and patient with all the young students in the class and gave them a preliminary introduction into this very important concept. I appreciated the effort the team put into this and I feel confident all the programmers will be successful in the future educational endeavors.

Hopefully, some members from the Programming Club will provide the same program to the library next year. If they do, we will definitely be participating.



This month Julie Magnus, branch manager, was able to help an Air Force veteran access his military records -- he dropped in one afternoon and asked about whether we could help him with accessing information on a CD. I said yes, we had external drives that we could use to help him with this. He came back a couple of weeks later, said he had tried another library that couldn't help him, and so came back to us, when he had some free time. He had thought he could use his laptop, originally, but then discovered it didn't have an appropriate drive to read the CD. He was having a tough time with scheduling, was working 2 jobs, and told me he had walked to the library from San Rafael. I first helped him to a seat, and then connected the drive, he pulled out a CD, and we were able to open and copy and save all the documents he needed -- it had been 2 years since he had first received them. He said he needed them for a job, and was very glad to finally have the access. It was great to have the tools to help navigate some of the obstacles our technology-driven world presents to people.

#### **Corte Madera**



A patron stopped in to thank Shereen Ash, L2 for her help some weeks ago. He teared up as explained, "Because of those two phone calls you made, I got my kids back". The patron who came in a month or so ago needing to have a child custody letter translated from Spanish into English and he was having trouble identifying where to go for assistance. I looked up agencies online and called the Marin County Information and Assistance line (457-INFO) for guidance. They suggested a legal aid organization I'd already mentioned to him, but he said he spoken with someone there and they said they did not offer translation services of legal letters. I offered to call the organization for the patron and explain what he needed. After speaking with someone at the agency and verifying that they did indeed offer these services, I asked if she spoke Spanish and passed the phone to the patron. They set up a meeting for later that day and his appeal for partial custody of his children was granted. He added that the Corte Madera Library is serving as a neutral location that he and the children's mother use when dropping off and picking up their children. This was a very moving conversation for me and the patron and demonstrated the sometimes unexpected outcome of our work.

On Saturday, May 18, Christopher, Kira and Jasper presented Drag Storytime at the Fairfax Library. Iris Meinolf, Children's Librarian, had been approached by Jasper, a trans high school student who grew up in Fairfax and was interested in presenting the program. Iris picked out a selection of books from our collection about gender identity for Jasper to choose from, and while he was here, Anthony Puga, Circulation Supervisor, issued Jasper a library card with his new chosen name (Jasper).

A week before the program, staff discovered we'd inadvertently double-booked the Community room, and so we decided to hold the storytime program in the children's room. The children's room was packed, and the program was incredibly successful. 35 people attended, including a little boy who likes to wear dresses. Children and caregivers listened to stories and heard why it's important to be able to choose what you wear.

Our program featured two Drag Kings and one Drag Queen. Kira read "Annie's Plaid Shirt" and wore her own plaid shirt. Christopher brought his two children and read "Prince and Knight." He asked the group if anyone had been to a wedding of two men, and his children answered "Yes! Yours!" Jasper, whose parents and twin sister also attended, brought a childhood picture of himself with long hair and a dress.

After the stories, Iris rolled tables into the children's room for a collage craft. One attendee observed "the children's room was a cozy place for this event; we all squeezed in and made room for everybody."

We are already planning another Drag Storytime for mid-June, and we're putting Jasper in touch with Libby at Cultural Services. She heard about our program and wants a Drag Storytime at the County Fair! Fairfax Friends of the Library sponsored this program which supported the Library's vision of a welcoming, equitable and inclusive environment for attendees to connect, learn and explore.

John Elison, Library Assistant II, held an Introduction to TAG (Teen Advisory Group) on May 21. Several girls showed up and contributed ideas for programs they'd like to see the library present, and learned about the existing teen programs. The following week, two of them showed up for John's teen role playing games program and brought friends. One of the new girls was creating her character, and said she didn't know if it should be male or female. "That's ok," another girl said, "you can just be gender-fluid, and if at some point you change your mind then the character can be trans." In relating this story to Margaret, John commented that it's great to be able to provide a forum where teens can have these conversations.

The popularity of our Chromebooks continues to increase, and several times this month we've had all four checked out and more people asking to use one. We originally purchased them for use during our busy after-school time; we're now having adults request to use them in the evenings so they can take them to the quiet area.

Margaret Miles, Branch Manager, leveraged the library's partnership with SURJ-Marin (Standing Up for Racial Justice) to include members of Community Land Trust Association of West Marin (CLAM) and Marin Environmental Housing Collective (MEHC) for our May Film & Conversation program on Housing Equity. Over 30 attendees viewed two short films streamed from Kanopy: "Hearts and Hands" and "Streets of Dreams." After WWII, people of color were systematically excluded from equal access to housing, and this created a dual housing market. By combining community ownership of land with individual ownership of homes, a Community Land Trust gives communities a powerful way to shape and secure its future, while opening the door to affordable homeownership for low-income residents.

The panel then led a discussion to explore how Community Land Trusts can change the future of Marin.

This program was held the same afternoon as Drag Storytime, so the library was overflowing with people when both programs ended. Debra Taube of SURJ-Marin said "I wanted to be in both rooms at once!"


Danny writes: On Tuesday, May 14, we had our social justice film screening on Grace Lee Boggs, a figure mostly known to the Black Power Movement and second wave feminism. Although she was around during the Asian American Movement of the late 60s and 70s, she mostly involved her work in predominantly Black communities calling Detroit her home for several decades. The event drew a modest crowd of about 6, about half of whom were affiliated with the North Bay Democratic Socialists Party, and a few more patrons who stopped to give the film a few minutes of their time. This group of folks were visibly in their twenties with the exception of two or three seniors. What I enjoyed from this screening is that people were speaking about grassroots politics and not diminishing individual agency in the face of systemic oppression. Grace Lee Boggs was 97 when she passed back in 2015 and that leaves a wide legacy for us to both examine and aspire to. I appreciated hearing from one of the elderly patrons that she was inspired in hearing how this woman was able to organize her community to instill sustained transformation. The discussion touched on protracted causes such as environmentalism, social mobility, housing, education, issues subsumed under racial and gender justice.

- Open House at Bayside MLK took place on Thursday, May 16. Kayla and Diana attended to represent the school and public library partnership. We gave away bookmarks, information on summer programs, and flyers for Books & BBQ.
- Etienne and Diana served on the selection panel for the Librarian II recruitment. Marin City was recruiting for a half-time (18.75 hours per week) LII. We selected Katrina Sadler, and she accepted. Katrina is currently working at the Bayview Branch of the San Francisco Public Library where she has created community-based social justice events and works on the Urban Collection. She also works at the San Jose Public Library (Yes, she works three jobs right now! She's leaving San Mateo to come to us!) serving teen and children. She has lots of experience in digital collections, creating social media and other digital content and doing outreach as well. She also has community college and university experience.

#### **MARINet Board Meeting Minutes**

March 21, 2019 MCFL Tech Services 1600 Los Gamos Dr., Suite 180, San Rafael CA 9:00 a.m.

The meeting was called to order at 9:05.

Present: Anji Brenner(MV), Jamie Poirier (SRP), Bonnie White (MCFL), Jacki Dunn (BEL-TIB), Abbot Chambers (SAU), Jessica Trenary (MARINet), Linda Kenton (SAN), Janice Akel (LRK),

I. Public Comment Period: None

II. Introduction of Guests: Jamie Poirier, Bonnie White

III. Approval of Minutes: February 21, 2019 Minutes were approved.

#### IV. Old Business

A. CENIC Update: Not much change. Still working with Marin IT to finish installing access points. Discussion was held about how payments are required up front, while reimbursements from CALIFA are way behind, causing difficulties in cash flow. Long-term costs are considerably higher than what was originally estimated when MARINet joined the network, impacting the consortium's budget. May need to look into other options when our CENIC contract is up at the end of the five-year contract. Staff will try to find out if other library systems are experiencing similar problems. The possibility of looking at MIDAS again might be useful.

#### V. New Business

A. Linkplus NorthNet Library System (NLS) option
A new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with NLS was distributed. The MOU is a five-year agreement to contract with NLS for InnReach Link+ services. After some discussion, the group agreed that Dan should sign it on behalf of MARINet. This will save the consortium a few thousand dollars per year.

- B. How to better support eBook budget
  - A chart in the System Administrator's report comparing eBook and physical book hold times shows a big difference, with eBook wait times considerably longer than physical book wait times. How can more money be put toward digital content?
  - Anji brought up the idea of creating a document that could be used in budget processes
    with city/town/county governments detailing the increasing need for funding for this
    format in library budgets. She will create a document for discussion at a future meeting.
  - It is thought that increased and separate funding for this content would give it more strength than splitting current collection development money between print and digital formats.

Other ideas discussed:

- Abbot talked about the finer points of buying from different publishers with different models and how funding could be optimized if time allowed for analysis.
- Some patrons are putting holds on both ebooks and print titles, which can artificially inflate hold list sizes.
- Linda thinks it would be a good idea to look at the hold ratio of print items to possibly increase it and put the extra money toward eBooks. Currently, libraries are supposed to buy an additional copy for every 5 local holds on an item. This will be discussed further at the next MARINet meeting.
- Overdrive is looking at creating a "Lucky Day" type of collection for ebooks.
- Anji suggested looking at grant opportunities to help fund digital collection increases.
   She will check into the Marin Community Foundation to see if this is feasible.
- DRWG would like to see digital materials getting more even footing with print materials.
- MARINet staff time for eBook purchasing and management has increased and continues to increase. Jessica talked about the many tasks associated with this area, and the strategies she uses to effectively deal with the collection.
- Libraries are encouraged to put extra funding into eBook collections. MCFL is spending an extra \$15,000 this year on bringing down the holds ratio for eBooks.
- Anji suggested an FAQ entry to explain to patrons how the holds ratio in MARINet works.
- C. Cloud records from Bibliocommons
  This was approved last month.
- Proposed Budget for FY 2019-20
   The previously-discussed Budget Resolution was signed by directors attending the meeting.

#### VI. Standing Items for the agenda

- A. System Administrator's report
  - Sierra update –Dan is working with III to roll back the latest server update so that the Sierra upgrade can take place.
  - Delivery service: problems with delivery personnel and traffic delays continue to be experienced from time-to-time, causing disruptions at libraries that count on timely deliveries. MARINet staff is monitoring the situation and asked to be notified when there are problems.
- B. Correspondence: None
- C. Topics for future agenda
  - CENIC progress and costs
  - Draft document for funding digital content Anji
  - Hold ratio issue 5:1 print
  - Look at additional book drops in central locations in Marin to benefit all libraries

#### VII. Non-action items

Mill Valley is looking at a putting in a book drop in Tam Junction. Anji talked with MARINet staff and MCFL Director about costs and other locations for the MARINet system. Would like to gauge interest from other libraries for additional drop off points.

#### VIII. Announcements

MV: The Poetry Illuminated project has been a big success and will continue for three more weeks, then revive in December or January of next year. May do one month in 5 or 6 locations downtown.

SR: Staff met on March 8 with Community Services staff in support of the merger between the library and Community Services. They are awaiting approval from the City to complete the merger. The Pop Up library at Northgate Mall location has been extended through April, and work continues on a longer-term MOU.

BEL-TIB: The Pop Up 94920 fundraising event will be on April 4. It highlights nine interesting local people who will talk about their work in a Ted-talk-like setting.

SA: Staff and patrons are happy to see the rainy season, with its threat of flooding, over. They are gearing up for summer reading.

LRK: Momentum for a new library building is growing. Lots of meetings about raising money, feasibility studies, architectural drawings, etc., are keeping her busy. The task force is young, new, and has lots of energy. In the meantime, they are looking at renovating the current library.
