





Are My Responses Confidential?



- Extremely strong laws protect the confidentiality of your census response. Title 13 is a federal statute that has existed for decades with $harsh\,consequences\,for\,people\,who\,violate\,census\,confidentiality.$ Wrongful disclosure can lead to a \$250,000, up to 5 years prison or
- The Census Bureau is not allowed to share your personal information with anyone, including ICE, police, landlords or any government
- . The Census Bureau cannot share information about you as an individual.

- (11) DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR JANUARY Director Jones reported on the following:
 - Director Jones reminded the commission about a discussion that we had at the May meeting in 2017 deciding what topics the Commission wanted to discuss at the various meetings for the next 2 years. We will do this again at our meeting in May 2020. She apprised the commission that we never did have the California Room report, and maybe we can reschedule this and have meeting at the Annex, and include Historian Dewey Livingston in this meeting. Another interesting person who might be included in a future meeting is Jeff Craemer. What we thought we were doing 2 years ago, and what we are doing today is entirely different then what we thought it would be.
 - President's Budget has again eliminated funding for the Institute of Museums and Library Services and there will be big significant congressional support to not eliminate IMLS. Federal money is a formula based on population, so if we are under-counted in the Census, California will get less money!

Our Marin County Free Library was designated as a 3-star facility (only 11 libraries in California are 3-5 star facilities). This is based on check out per capita, both print and ecirculations; use of computers; program attendance, visits and Wi-Fi sessions.

Chantel announced the upcoming Voting Rights Celebration: 19th Amendment to Voter Inclusion in 2020. Please join the MCFL as they celebrate the ongoing struggle for Universal Voting Rights, Voter inclusion and the Centennial of the 19th Amendment, which gave women the right to vote though man remained disenfranchised 100 years ago. All presentations will be at the Annex, a reception will be at 6pm, with the presentation starting at 6:30pm. Library Commissioner Ream will be giving one of the presentations on Monday, March 28.

On February 25th we hosted the inaugural event of MCFL's Voting Rights speaker series at our Map & Special Collections Annex. We were honored to present an illustrated talk by **Dr. Patricia Dougherty, OP** on **Votes for U.S. Women: The 72 Year Struggle. Dr. Dougherty gave a fascinating and nuanced talk on how it took 72 years from the first demand for a woman's right to vote in the 1848 Declaration of Sentiments at Seneca Falls, New York, until the 19th amendment was ratified by the 36th state, Tennessee, in August 1920. Delicious refreshments for the reception were underwritten by Jeff Craemer and members of the Friends of the Library helped us dismantle chairs and put the room back in order after the event. We are also very grateful to the Friends of the Library for underwriting stipends for all of the presenters in our speaker's series. Over 50 guests attended the event.**

Our Women's Suffrage & Voting Rights exhibit at the Civic Center Library has been enhanced this month by a few additional items. Most notably a Depression-era ballot box once used by the County of Marin which was donated by philanthropist Jeff Craemer. We reached out to our colleague Dewey Livingston who designed & built a display case for this interesting artifact. We have also put on display an IBM "Votomatic," used by the Marin County Elections Department from 1966 to 1999.

In collaboration with Library Director Sara Jones, Asst. Library Director Chantel Walker, the MCFL Voting Rights Committee and County PIO Brent Ainsworth, a press release for MCFL's Voting Rights Celebration has been crafted and disseminated. This resulted in good publicity for our speaker's series in both the I.J. and the S.F. Chronicle's datebook section.

California Room intern and Dominican University student Amanda Isaacs has made contributions at both of our locations. In the California Room, she has organized a recently-donated group of original bills of sale pertaining to shipments by the North Pacific Coast Railroad Company of coal, lumber and other construction materials for the American Land & Trust Co., the real estate development company which began the subdivision of what is now the Town of Larkspur, in 1887. Amanda's archival efforts will allow future researchers to access and interpret this significant aspect of Marin County's history.

At the Annex, Amanda has been learning how to preserve oversized broadsides and posters advertising the Marin County Fair (1940spresent) and events held at the Marin Center since 1972.

Both projects have allowed Amanda to gain practical experience in the field of Archival Science. Carol has been mentoring Amanda as she applies to graduate programs in history and archives.

California Room



Our digital collections have been greatly enhanced this month by a fascinating archive documenting the work of West Marin architect Sim Van der Ryn, a pioneer in sustainable building since the early 1970s. Digital Archivist Carol Acquaviva added over 1500 items to the Sim Van der Ryn digital collection which had been digitized and catalogued by archivist and photographer Owen Gump, thanks to a grant from philanthropist Jeff Craemer and matching funding from the Van der Ryn family. The collection provides insight into Sim's design concepts which incorporate both urban and organic forms. While a professor at UC Berkeley in 1971, Van der Ryn and colleague Jim Campe held a studio course for undergraduates on Van der Ryn's Inverness property. The course, "Making a Place in the Country—The Outlaw Builder's Studio" was an experimental seminar involving onsite building construction where students collaborated in building their own shelters and communal buildings and lived together on the property for the course's duration. Using wood salvaged from demolished chicken coops in Petaluma and materials found on site, the 30 students constructed a temporary, back to the land, D.I.Y. communal village.

We are pleased to announce that map archivist & Community Library Specialist Dewey Livingston is a CONTENTdm cataloguer in training! Carol has been training him this month and we look forward to his future contributions to our digital archive.

On Saturday, February 15th, the California Room partnered with the Jack Mason Museum of West Marin history in a multi-media public event titled *Outlaw Builders*. It encompassed a film screening featuring 1971 film footage & the re-release of the 1972 Publication *Outlaw Building News* with Inverness architect Jim Campe, and launch of the Sim Van der Ryn digital archive by the Anne T. Kent California Room (see Digital Literacy section, above). Photographer & archivist Owen Gump gave an introductory PowerPoint featuring images from our new digital collection. Laurie represented the California Room at the event which was held at Point Reyes Station and drew a standing-room only crowd of over a hundred people. To the left, a picture of architects Sim Van der Ryn & Jim Campe with some of their former students.

Oral Historian Marilyn Geary & Librarian Laurie Thompson interviewed long-time San Geronimo Valley resident Ruth Benz. This oral history was the first in a series in partnership with the newly formed San Geronimo Valley Historical Society chaired by local historian Owen Clapp. Ruth related the many changes she has witnessed in Woodacre over the past 70 years, including insight into San Geronimo Valley pioneers and businesses. The famed Woodacre Improvement Club (formerly the residence of the pioneer Maillard family) was still extant when Ruth and her family first moved to Woodacre in the early 1950s. It was especially interesting to hear how the community used that facility in the mid-20th century and of the many local clubs and groups that met there, including a local theater group.


- We received a donation of a framed watercolor depicting the Hutchinson Quarry, painted around 1950, by the donor's aunt, Marjorie Backus Anderson. Anderson studied art at the University of Wisconsin, and was a sorority sister of Frank Lloyd Wright's nieces. Anderson met Wright at his home in the 1930s. This piece is significant as it was painted while the quarry was still in operation.
- The Marin Garden Club continues to generously donate to the California Room, club-related items dating from 1931 to the present. Garden Club History Chair, Vera Felchin, visited the Annex for the first time, to observe how we have begun to preserve and organize the Club's history. Vera kindly expressed gratitude on behalf of the Club: "I reported to the Marin Garden Club Board that our records, collections etc. are safely stored in the Anne T. Kent California Room. All members are delighted and are excited."
