(7) LITERACY/WEST MARIN REPORT - Bonny White, W. Marin Branch Manager



1. Welcome to the Inverness Library, our littlest and cutest library branch. We are so fortunate here that the gardens are maintained by the Inverness Garden Club. Inverness Library is also home to the Jack Mason Museum of West Marin History – I hope you have time to enjoy the show.



In thinking about your visit, I thought you might enjoy hearing some good news, and we have lots of that here in West Marin – so here are some moments to celebrate.



For five years, West Marin Literacy Services was without a Coordinator. Our office assistant, Ana Maria Ramirez and I kept things afloat, making sure ESL classes were offered throughout West Marin, keeping Summer Reading on the Ranches going, and staying in touch with our volunteer tutors. But Ana Maria only worked about 10 hours a week and I have a few other responsibilities, so it was a great relief when we were able to hold a recruitment last August. The successful candidate was Annemarie Russo. Annemarie lives in Bolinas with her husband, Jacob, whom she met in Mexico, and her three children. She and Jacob have a bilingual and bicultural household, so she came to us fully bilingual and with a real understanding of West Marin. More about Annemarie in a minute.



One of Annemarie's goals from the beginning was to start an English/Spanish language Conversation Club, which she did, not a month after being hired. This is a really casual, fun group of people who are working on their language skills. This project was around the holidays when they all made greeting cards, using their second language, to give to a community member who spoke their "opposite" language. They also learned tortilla and salsa making from Ana Maria, and had great discussions about cultural celebrations in the United States and in Mexico.



While most of Annemarie's time is spent with our English Language Learners, she also works part-time at the Point Reyes Library. Shortly after launching the conversation club, she let us know that her next project would be bilingual story times. We have tried to offer these classes in the past, be we've had real trouble attracting an audience. There aren't many children in West Marin so we thought it might be hopeless, until Annemarie came along. Because in addition to being a Community Library Specialist, Annemarie is a highly skilled Licensed Midwife. In fact she delivered many of the babies in Point Reyes, Inverness and Bolinas, so she had a built-in following.



Next on our wish list for West Marin Literacy was to "grow" our volunteer tutor base, so we organized our first local ESL tutor training in February. The response to our ad was really gratifying, with more than a dozen people coming to learn about our services. As a result of the training, we now have a healthy crew of 15 tutor pairs working throughout West Marin, with more coming on every week.



Then in March, the new Superintendent of Shoreline Unified School District, Bob Raines and I put our heads together to figure out how to offer more frequent ESL classes in Tomales and Point Reyes. We've always offered just one evening class in both of these communities but we both felt that if class was offered more frequently, our students would progress more rapidly. After we met and strategized, Bob applied for block grant funds so that we now offer 5 classes a week both in Tomales and in Point Reyes.



Our small group classes in Tomales, Point Reyes, Bolinas and San Geronimo are very good at teaching basic spoken and written English, but when people have progressed enough that they can use their English to learn content, they are ready for college. Because of a partnership with Literacyworks Center in Petaluma, we now have 22 students enrolled at Santa Rosa J.C.



Here are pictures from our first-ever Cesar Chavez Day celebration in West Marin on March 30. Music was provided by well-known guitarist and singer, Francisco Herrera and Annemarie's husband, Jacob. We had visits from local celebrities like Gus Conde and Loretta Farley, and Gus actually interviewed a Bolinas resident who knew and worked with Cesar Chavez.



We also celebrated El día de los niños/El día de los libros in West Marin – three times! On April 28th, our dear Friends from Circus of Smiles travelled with me to perform successful bilingual shows for assemblies at Tomales and West Marin Schools. Then on April 30, Annemarie partnered with Papermill Creek Children's Corner Preschool for a Dia program at the Town Commons where musician Mariela Herrera performed and we gave away more than 50 books to children.



Getting serious for just a moment, you need to know that our community is really very worried about the changes to immigration policy, starting in January. In response, we brought Immigration Attorney, Alyssa Simpson to discuss this issue with a very large crowd at West Marin School in January. We helped facilitate other immigration workshops throughout the spring where families could do essential paperwork, designating caregivers for their minor children should they face deportation. Annemarie is currently studying to be BIA certified so that she can offer assistance to immigrant families who want to apply for U.S. Citizenship (BIA stands for Board of Immigration Appeals, under the Department of Justice.)



On one of the stormiest nights of the year, Bolinas Library's neighbor and good friend, Frances McDormand, dropped in at the Library to read Bill Peet stories to our children. In other Bolinas news, at their April meeting, the Friends of the Bolinas and Stinson Beach Libraries decided to continue their support for extended hours for eight more years!



And in Stinson Beach, Community Library Specialist, Kerry Livingston celebrated 30 years of devoted service to the Marin County Free Library with the Marin County Board of Supervisors.

Sara Jones, Director of County Library Services Marin County Free Library Report For May 2017

Personnel (Florence Pattison)

Nine applications had been received for the vacant Community Library Specialist position in the FLAGship assignment on the scheduled closing date of Monday, May 22, 2017. It was decided to continue accepting applications on an 'Open Until Filled' basis, but to interview six candidates in the meantime who are considered highly qualified. These candidates will be interviewed on Tuesday, June 6, 2017.

A recruitment for a part time Library Assistant I at the Stinson Beach library will open on Friday, June 9, and close four weeks later on Friday, July 7, 2017. It's hoped that this position will be filled by early August. This vacancy was created by the resignation of Larisa Proulx.

Many of the new positions to support MCFL's education initiatives and partnerships, which were approved at the April 11 meeting of the Board of Supervisors, have gone through the hiring review process and recruitment planning has begun. These are:

- Senior Librarian, South Novato
- Community Library Specialist, Maker Space Coordinator, South Novato
- Mobile Library Assistant, Bookmobile
- Library Aide, Novato (to be filled from a current list)

Other recruitments to be started in the near future are:

- Librarian I, South Novato
- Library Assistant II, Fairfax
- Librarian II, Fairfax
- Library Assistant I, Marin City
- Library Assistant II, Marin City

The Accounting Assistant position in Administration continues to be filled by an extra hire employee and the vacant Library Services Manager position at Technical Services also continues to be backfilled by Scott Bauer.

Library Activities:

Below are reports submitted to keep you abreast of library activities directly related to our three primary goals from the MCFL strategic plan and the mission *to create connections to explore, imagine and innovate*:

- Goal 1- Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together
- Goal 2 Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression
- Goal 3- Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy
- Goal 4- Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning (new goal)

Outreach/ Bookmobile (Damon Hill)

Planning for the Summer Challenge is in the air! The STEM activities are rolling in and the bookmokile is in full preparation mode. The Bookmobile does the typical Summer Challenge for the ranch families they serve and they have some great book giveaways, learning challenges and raffles planned. The staff believes it is so important to keep these kids reading over the summer----particularly the beginning readers who have just started to figure it out this month. If fun books are not available, they can lose the skills they have just gained. The Bookmobile is succeeding in developing ideas so many fun ideas that they will not be able to resist! The Bookmobile also packed the kids' DVD section with fun educational choices so they'll have even more ways to learn. The rural digital divide makes it so expensive for families to have cable for internet and TV that the usual Sesame Street and PBS programs are not available for these families who really need it. We are hoping to supplement the gap and make for a fun learning summer. (Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together)

The Bookmobile is adding Lynwood School in Novato to our stops this summer. About 350 Pre-K through 5th graders attend Lynwood and many of the families have limited access to other libraries. They will be bringing the bookmobile and lots of fun STEAM activities to the school this summer and look forward to working with the kids and families. The food bank will be doing a food pantry at the same time. This will be a great opportunity to see how our services can intersect and serve the diverse needs of our county residents. (Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together and Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

The Bookmobile stop at The Redwoods in Mill Valley continues to be very busy stop. They are delighted to be back serving our seniors at the facility. One of the patrons comes on with his wife at the beginning of the stop and enjoys perusing books on the back couch during our entire stop. His wife says that he looks forward to our every visit and it is his favorite hour of the week! He is the poster child for a lifelong learner---still an enthusiastic reader at 96. (Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning)

The bookmobile and the Marin City library staff attended the Enlighten Conference in Marin City on Saturday, May 20th. 150 girls from 6th through 12th grade spend the day with adult professional women who act as mentors. The day is full of workshops and a sit down lunch. The bookmobile and Marin City staff had a variety of STEAM activities for the participants to engage in. There was also had a display of fantastic giveaway books for the girls, thanks to the generosity of The Book Place. We were able to promote The Book Place to many local residents who were not aware of it. (Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

There was a table for the County of Marin Career Development Day on May 24 and 25. The table promoted MCFL to Marin County Employees. This was an excellent opportunity for employees who do not live in the MCFL jurisdiction to learn about the benefit of having valuable access to electronic resources typically only available to residents in jurisdiction. Library cards were issued to many participants and the Read to Lead Book Club was featured.

Damon Hill, Marin City staff and San Rafael staff met in May to plan a partnership with the National Parks Service to bring underserved youth from Marin to local National Parks via the Library. Marin City will have the first event in June and on July 29th in partnership with the Novato Unified School District and YMCA will bring families from the South Novato Library. (Be the preferred place for children, families, and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together)

Two new students have enrolled in Career Online High School. Both students will be starting from the 9th grade module and will have 18 months to complete credits in the Career field of their choice. Damon continues to work with students on progressing through the program and navigating the online program process.

The Veterans Resource Center had 2 clients visit for services after a period of inactivity. on May 4 the final meeting of the Talking Service: Standing Down Book Club met. The book club facilitator met with Sara Jones and Damon Hill to discuss how to bring the Book Club model to the State level in other libraries. A meeting is set up in June to discuss with

representatives of the grant. Damon Hill also attended a training related to Veterans "From Combat to Community".

Damon Hill continued to participate in the Adult Maker lab on Thursday evenings. Damon also is now the representative to the Five Year Business Plan Committee from the Library

Gail Grant continued to provide graphical support during the month:


A large portion of graphical work was to support the Summer Challenge starting in June.

Kathleen continued her involvement as the system-wide MITM training wrapped up this month. She, Sara Hathaway, and Liz Paris began next steps for data collection and the design of a controlled vocabulary for codifying the data. Kathleen also spent much of May planning a thank-you luncheon and de-brief meeting with all the trainers at Homeward Bound's The Key Room in Novato. Sara Jones graciously allotted funds for a delicious catered lunch and trainers were able to talk about what worked well with the training, what didn't work well, what was a surprise, and what was not a surprise. MCFL staff were joined by Suzanne Flint, our LTSA grant coordinator from Sacramento. Suzanne provided much support and information about what to include in the final grant report. A big thank you goes to Tricia for her wonderful hand-made terrariums that served as both centerpieces and thank you gifts. It was especially nice using Homeward Bound's services as they provide culinary training for homeless families and veterans to get them back on their feet. The food was delicious! Kathleen spoke with Viki Card, the Homeward Bound coordinator, about future library partnerships. (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers And Staff to connect, learn and grow together)

Kathleen transitioned immediately from MITM to Summer Challenge this month. She spent much of this month recruiting tween and teen volunteers to assist her this summer. She was very touched that many previous volunteers asked to return because they enjoyed their experience. Kathleen conducted the recruitment as a job interview to give the kids their first experience of being in a job interview, filling out documents both in print and online and being accountable for that, and negotiating a schedule. She also covered the do's and don'ts of a professional handshake, much to their bewilderment. (Goal 2 – Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

Kathleen collaborated with Joshua Alperin from the Pickleweed library and the duo visited Dixie and San Rafael school district schools performing a skit as **Pigeon** (Mo Willems) and **Fly Guy** (Ted Arnold). Multiple auditorium presentations were made to all grade levels and as with every yearly visit, it is very rewarding to Kathleen to see how many students know "Miss Kitty" and use the Civic Center Library. Kathleen was quite moved to receive a bound thank-you book from Ms. Lum's Kindergarten class. Miss Kitty was a guest reader for Young Author's Fair Week. This delightful book included a page from each student with a hand-drawn illustration and a comment "I think one of the best things about you is..."

This gift will be treasured forever and it is a testament to Ms. Lum's incredible teaching talents and thoughtfulness. (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together)

This month saw the last Wednesday 10:30 Toddler Storytime as it goes on break during June and July to focus on the Summer Challenge. Denise will launch a new Music and Movement storytime in August that will replace Toddler Time. Kathleen gifted all the longtime participants of Toddler Time with a bilingual book "It's our Storytime!" so that they can keep storytime momentum going at home and as a thank-you for being loyal and enthusiastic storytime participants. They especially enjoyed the Alcatraz exhibit and learning about Frank Lloyd Wright. Many of the children took "selfies" with our life-size cut-out of Frank Lloyd Wright. (Goal 2-Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery & expression).

Laurie worked with *Prison Arts Touching Hearts* (P.A.T.H.)
Director Leslie Lakes to mount

an exhibit in the California Room display cases titled *Art Escape at Alcatraz*. It features inmate art, poetry and historic ephemera celebrating the history of Alcatraz Island. It's part of a larger initiative by Lakes to promote artwork by incarcerated artists and compliments an exhibit currently on display at Alcatraz Island. Our Alcatraz exhibit will be up through the end of June. (*Goal 1- Preferred place for children/families to connect, learn and grow together*).





On May 4th naval historian and nautical archaeologist

Edward Von der Porten gave an illustrated talk on the wreck of the 16th-century Manila Galleon San Juanillo off the coast of Baja California. The audience was fascinated with the insights Von der Porten & his team gained from multiple

expeditions to the site where they uncovered Ming porcelain chards, Iberian pottery and Chinese bronzes, among other treasures.



Some of the artifacts found relate to porcelain chards discovered near Drake's Bay of which Von der Porten is also an expert. (4- Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning).



Digital Archivist Carol Acquaviva represented the California Room at the Countywide Volunteer Appreciation reception at the

end of April. Carol is pictured here with long-time volunteer and genealogist Cathy Gowdy and one of our more recent volunteers, Brian Crawford, who is helping us catalog maps at the



Schroeder Collection. (4- Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning).

Thanks to the hard work of Digital Archivist Carol Acquaviva, our new mobile-friendly version of CONTENTdm is now live. OCLC is impressed and plans to feature our Frank Lloyd Wright collection on their CONTENTdm site. (Goal 3- Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy).





On May 11th Jack Schaeffer with Act 3 partners came to the Schroeder & Special Collections Annex to present their protocol for creating high-resolution digital reproductions of historic materials, including maps and oversize items. We were impressed with their portfolio and accepted Jack's invitation to do a complimentary digital replica of one of our historic maps. Based on the results of this pilot we plan to seek funding to do a 4-day project which would allow us digitize several thousand maps and corresponding ephemera. Corte Madera and Marin City (Julie Magnus)

Kristine Augestad, Library Aide and Librarian Shereen Ash participated in the Corte Madera Recreation Center Senior Fair. They shared information about library programs, services and resources and booklists and distributed flyers for upcoming events. They answered reference questions using an iPad. They also heard some great feedback about Marin libraries in general, and the Corte Madera Library in particular. One woman said she found the Corte

Madera Library very welcoming. She enjoys the light in the Community Room, where she attended a performance by the Slavyanka Chorus, and the garden benches just outside the

front door. She said Corte Madera was a "kickass" library. A number of patrons commented on how much they appreciated the variety and quality of our programs for adults. Our May, Monday morning program about travel to Iceland was mentioned often. It was extremely popular, with 58 people attending, spilling out of the Community Room. The Golden Gate Flute Chorus was also a popular event this month. (Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

We worked closely with the Planning Department for the Town of Corte Madera to support their efforts to gain a special designation from FEMA that would increase monetary support for residents should they need to file a claim due to flooding. Shereen Ash, Librarian II, had the required FEMA documents added to our collection, designating a section for them in our government documents area. A special thank you to Mildred Arencibia, Cataloging Librarian I, for her speed in getting these documents ready, and for her creativity in packaging the large flood maps in an accessible manner. Julie Magnus, Library Branch Manager, provided a letter to the Planning Department detailing the FEMA documents available at the library. We are happy to report that the enhanced FEMA designation was granted. (Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Volunteer news: Lynn Fabian, Library Desk Supervisor, reports that Marni Hansen received her 2-year award and Blossom Young received her 12 year award- they have both helped to process our material, replace worn covers, and shelved material to help maintain an attractive collection. We really appreciate the contributions of our faithful volunteers. (*Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.*)

The last team session for all of our library staff learning about Mind in the Making took place at the Corte Madera Library on May 17. This project has been a tremendous undertaking, involving vision and teamwork and lots of contributions, especially from our director, Sara Jones, and the organizers, Sara Hathaway and Kathleen Fitzhugh-Remitz, as well as all the trainers and participants. We have all gained a lot of understanding about the importance of executive functions and their role in developing successful lives. Our system goal – to share the ideas and vocabulary, and to transmute that understanding into simple acts that can make a difference for our patrons, our colleagues and ourselves – was a worthy one, and we'll now move into the next phase of



tweaking our services and actions to aid in development of these essential life skills.

Youth services Librarian, Sarah Butts, and Children's Librarian, Marilyn Wronsky, have been tireless in their efforts to reach out to local students and parents. On May 17 Sarah attended the ELAC meeting for parents of Hall MS students. Sarah spoke with about 15 parents of ELAC students about the summer programs for teens and children. On May 23, Marilyn and Sarah began summer learning outreach in earnest with a visit to Hall Middle School. Visits to Neil Cummins and the Cove School by the end of the month put them in contact with all of the Larkspur-Corte Madera students, over 1500 kids. On May 30, with school libraries closed, teachers are looking to bring classes into the library for some last minute books. Class visits are planned through the end of May, with multiple new library cards applications being submitted. (Goal 1 - Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.)

On May 16, Sarah hosted the last lunchtime book club of the year at Kent Middle School. The students have enjoyed the club, and plans are in place to resume next year! On May 30, Sarah hosted a table at the Kent Volunteer Fair, informing 7th graders about opportunities for volunteer work at the library, and promoting the summer program. (Goal 2 - Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

On Friday, May 12, the Corporation for Education Network Initiatives in California, or CENIC, network was deployed at the Corte Madera Library and several other branches in MCFL including Point Reyes, Inverness, Bolinas, Stinson Beach and Civic Center. The remaining MCFL branches will be added soon. CENIC is a nonprofit organization that operates the California Research and Education Network (CalREN), a high-capacity network serving schools, educators, researchers and other vital public-serving institutions. CENIC's Charter Associates are part of the world's largest education system; they include the California K-12 system, California Community Colleges, the California State University system, California's Public Libraries, the University of California system, Stanford, Caltech, and USC. CENIC delivers high-performance, high-bandwidth networking services, providing us much faster connection speeds at a significantly lower cost. This new network means libraries can better meet the demand of our patrons who use our wireless services and networked public computers. (Goal 3 – Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy.)



Discovering books with a sense of place helps us all learn about the world and see things from a different perspective. Our current display focuses on books that evoke environments, places and times-- they take us out of ourselves and into somewhere new. Patron comments have been positive--people are intrigued with this way of looking at browsing with a geographical bent. The library can be the doorway to many places! (Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Marin City Library

Etienne Douglas, Community Library Specialist/WebStar Coordinator, Faheem Bassa, Senior WebStar, and Misbah Mamoon, WebStar, went to DC with Sara Jones for National Library Legislation Day. They participated in contacting our legislators and communicating all the ways that libraries play a critical part in creating successful communities and how they help people, young and old, find opportunities to grow and develop. They also were able to visit some of the incredible cultural institutions in our nation's capital, including the National Museum of African American History and Culture. Faheem shared that he never expected to have such experiences when he first thought about being involved with libraries, but that he is really inspired by what he's done, and wants to pursue working in libraries as a career! (Goal 1 - Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together and Goal 2 - Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)



A box from Blood Orange Press arrived in the library via express mail. It turned out to be a beautiful and very generous gift. Someone had supported the publisher's #ReadInColor Campaign to help them "make books that celebrate kids and stories too rarely seen in children's literature." Instead of receiving the thank you gift themselves, the person asked that the gift be sent to us. It was a beautiful tote bag, copies of the bilingual book, One of A Kind Like Me Unico Como Yo, bookmarks, posters, and notecards. Diana Lopez, Librarian I, gave a book and poster to Terry Jones at the Bookmobile. She also gave one to the Manzanita Children's Center, Marin City Learning Center (preschool), and one to Bayside/MLK Library.

Etienne Douglas, Community Library Specialist/WebStar Coordinator, and Faheem Bassa, Senior WebStar, went to the Bayside MLK BBQ sponsored by the Boys & Girls Club. Diana Lopez, Librarian I, packed up the Giant Jenga, giant soccer ball, and some catch games for them to take. They also took summer learning challenge information to share. Etienne mentioned that we were the ones that brought the fun stuff and that everyone was very grateful and had a good time. (Goal 1 - Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together. Goal 2 - Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

George Pegelow from the Marin Chapter of the ACLU presented a talk on the importance of understanding our civil rights in current times. We showed the film "Hidden Figures." More than half a century ago, three brilliant African-American women conquered racism and sexism to help launch the United States into space. As part of a special storytime, 24 kindergarten kids visited MCI. At school, they'd been learning about Australia. Sarah Butts, Youth Services Librarian, prepared a wonderful storytime and educational talk about Australia. The kids were fascinated by the facts that she shared with them. Then they colored paper boomerangs. The teachers loved everything that she did and asked for boomerang templates so they could make more back at school. We issued 6 new library cards and did a replacement for one of the moms. (Goal 1 - Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together and Goal 2 - Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

Diana Lopez, Librarian I, had followed up a couple of times with a patron who had called a while ago about a name correction on her Friends of the Marin County Free Library membership card. The patron called to say "thank you" and to tell Diana that she had received her new card. She said, "That's what I love about the Marin City Library. Everyone is so caring." (Goal 1 - Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.)

Performing Stars of Marin celebrated its fourth annual Enlighten event, to recognize and inspire achievement in young women. The conference took place in Marin City, and this year's theme was STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math). MCFL staff including Terry Jones, Mobile Library Services; Julie Magnus, Corte Madera and Marin City Libraries Branch Manager; Etienne Douglas, Marin City Library WebStar Coordinator; Faheem Bassa, WebStar; and Aneta Radonov, Library Assistant I, were on hand to showcase library materials and engage the participants in STEAM related activities like learning about robots using Cubelets, creating structures with Strawbees, and trying virtual reality. The girls also learned about physics and circuitry with activities prepared by Marin City Librarian, Diana Lopez.

Marcia Stieger, Library Aide, continues to coordinate monthly art displays in our community room. May's show featured 3D art by Robert Bloomberg, and his reception on May 2 drew 60 people. (Goal 4: Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

US Poet Laureate and local resident Kay Ryan was recently elected to the American Academy of Arts and Letters, an honor society limited to 250 members. Theresa McGovern, Librarian 2, created a display of her books and a sign acknowledging her most recent honor. 

The conference was the best Jennifer has attended and she went away with a lot of information to share with peers and staff. The Equity Alliance met a few weeks after the conference to make plans for moving forward and it was decided that a potluck would be a good way to get staff together for some discussions.


An email went out to all cardholders in mid-May about the coming discontinuation of 3M Cloud Library. We got 5 responses immediately and a few more trickled in over the last week. We didn't receive any negative responses, instead somefolks wanted to make sure they still had access to eBooks in some way (Overdrive, etc.). Others were highly supportive, voicing their appreciation for our offerings of eBooks and other eResources. Ivan G wrote: "I am very glad you are phasing out the 3M Cloud Library. I own a Kindle, and so can only use your OverDrive platform subscription to check out e-books. Resource redundancy is wasteful, so your improved purchasing policy is important. Efficiency is actually easier than having waste, and you're doing things right, so thank you." (Goal 3 - Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy)

There's been a huge uptick in Discover & Go support questions over the last few weeks. We usually get 1 or 2 a month but we've been getting about 8 a week since late April! This is great news because it means people are using the service. Most of the issues have to do with patrons not remembering their library card PIN/password. Which, if you think about it, means we are probably reaching less active users – another win! (Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning)

In May we met with representatives from OrangeBoy who helps us further refine definitions and expectations for the new Adult goal. The next steps will be for the Adult Services Committee to come up with some measureable goals. (Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning)

In scattered eLibrary news: the namechange and rebranding of "Zinio for Libraries" to "RBDigital" is still being figured out. Jennifer attended a webinar about the upcoming changes and met with a rep to get some patron and staff questions answered. They still haven't given us a firm date but say that *most likely* it will be launched at ALA Annual which is in late June. The goal is make the transition as smooth as possible for patrons and staff, which is going to be tricky with a name change and switch to a new app. Jennifer and Scott met with a sales representative from Libraryldeas to see a demonstration of a new hybrid digital/physical video product. It was interesting, but both Scott and Jennifer felt it was a very niche product that didn't meet any of our immediate collection needs. Jennifer has a conference call scheduled with Brainfuse at the end of the month to discuss our continually diminishing usage – the online homework help service is vital to our equity efforts but we're getting a lot of pushback from other MARINet libraries who are paying for the service and see no use. We may need to go back to paying for this on our own. (Goal 3 - Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy)

We finally named our Intranet! A year after it was launched, we christened it "Backstage" - the winning suggestion by Novato staffer Isabel Macias. 57 staff voted on the name.



Lastly, the MARINet Board approved requests from members of the MARINet EBWG & DRWG to combine into one working group. This cuts down on staff travel time (and time spent away from the desk) and makes sense seeing that 5 staff were in both groups and many topics were discussed in both groups (Hoopla, etc.).

West Marin (Bonny White)

During the spring, we always celebrate El día de los niños/El día de los libros in West Marín, and this year, we celebrated three times! On April 28th, our friends from Circus of Smiles travelled with Bonny to perform successful bilingual shows for assemblies at Tomales and West Marin Schools. Then on April 30, Annemarie Russo partnered with Papermill Creek Children's Corner Preschool for a Dia program at the Town Commons in Point Reyes, where musician Mariela Herrera performed and we gave away more than 50 books to local children. (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.)





During the first week in May, Bonny, Eva, Janet, Anthony, Annemarie and many others from MCFL attended the Othering and Belonging Conference, sponsored by the Haas Institute for a Fair and Inclusive Society in Oakland, California. The stunning lineup of speakers included Shakti Butler, LaToya Ruby Frazier, Kumi Naidoo, and Zephyr Teachout. We all learned more about equity that we will put to use as part of MCFL's ongoing Equity efforts. (Goal 4 – Support 22)

Jennifer and Bonny supplied coffee and treats to the steady stream of people who wanted to visit with Supervisor Rodoni. Then on Friday, May 12, we did it all again down in Stinson Beach where once again there was a line of people waiting to visit with their new Supervisor. On May 10, Bonny gave a presentation to the Marin County Library Commission when they visited the Inverness Library. The focus of the talk was about all the new services and programs we are offering at West Marin Literacy Services since hiring our new coordinator, Annemarie Russo. Annemarie is pictured below, leading a bilingual preschool story time. She also offers a bilingual Mother Goose on the Loose program and an English/Spanish conversation group for adults. On Wednesday May 17, the Point Reyes Library hosted a very effective outreach event. West Marin School has been having a series of parenting workshops this year. In May, the topic was Internet Safety, Cyber-Bullying, and Childhood Stress and Anxiety. Jennifer set up a library outreach table at the school gym, and two of the professional presenters browsed the collection before speaking. They liked the materials so much that they recommended them during their talks. The outcome was that Jennifer checked out many great, topical books, in English and in Spanish to the attendees. (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.) (Goal 2 –Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)





The week of May 15 was bittersweet for all of MCFL, as our FLAGship Coordinator, Ambre Dailey, celebrated her last week of work before moving back to Vermont with her family. Ambre has been working onboard the FLAGship for more than 12 years, traveling thousands of miles to serve thousands of Marin County children who wouldn't otherwise have gotten exposure to preschool. Ambre was celebrated on the evening of May 15 at the regular meeting of the First 5 Marin Children and Families Commission with a plaque in her honor, presented by Amy Reisch and Michelle Fadelli of First 5. Then on May 18, at the site of Ambre's last official stop as FLAGship Coordinator, we had a farewell party at the Civic Center Lagoon picnic area. Michelle Garcilazo of Congressman Jared Huffman's office was on hand, along with dozens of Ambre's friends and admirers, to present Ambre with a certificate, acknowledging her fine work with the FLAGship program. Larisa Proulx who was our Library Assistant I at the Stinson Beach Library resigned in May in order to accept an appointment doing preservation work for the National Park Service at Tule Lake. Even though her tenure at Stinson Beach has been relatively short, Larisa has many good friends who got together on her last day, May 23, to wish her well. We fully expect Larisa to return to West Marin as an extra-hire once her job with the Park Service is over.



On the evening of May 25, Bolinas Library hosted an impromptu poetry reading with former Bolinas resident and poet, Ellen Sander who now lives in Maine. The book is *Hawthorne*, the name of the street she lived on in Bolinas, many years ago. The reading provided attendees with an authentic walk through 60's Bolinas, complete with references to Bob Dylan, Gary Snyder, Joanne Kyger and other famous writers and poets who all briefly came together in Bolinas at that time. (Goal 4 – Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Here is a Point Reyes story that we think perfectly illustrates the essence of Goal 2, where Jennifer was able to support a young person in our community with opportunities for self-discovery. Recently a high school senior stopped in the Point Reyes Library and in chatting with him, Jennifer found out that during his last month of high school, he's doing an internship with a local interior designer, and he was interested in books by architect, Sim Van der Ryn. Jennifer asked whether he knew that Van der Ryn was a local person, which really surprised him. After going home and reading Van der Ryn's books on ecological design, he emailed Jennifer, asking whether she possibly knew of a way for him to meet Van Der Ryn of Inverness. Jennifer made the phone call and sure enough, our aspiring teen designer will now be able to meet with one of his personal heroes. (Goal 2 –Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

On May 25, at the invitation of Chantel Walker, Bonny spoke on a Career Day panel at the Embassy Suites Hotel along with Max Korten of Parks, Lorenzo Cordova, Aide to Supervisor Dennis Rodoni, and County Counsel, Brian E. Washington. The topic of our panel discussion was diversity and inclusion. (Goal 4 – Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

From Mid-May to August, there is never a dull moment in West Marin. Toward the end of May, the Point Reyes Library Meeting Room always becomes an assembly line as we prepare to execute the 16 summer learning events planned for our four physical branches during June, July, and August. When we are completely finished with the planning phase, each library branch will get a binder, complete with instructions and flyers for each summer challenge and program. This really helps as we make our annual school visits. As soon as this phase is complete, we move on to planning our summer Reading on the Ranches program and West Marin Wildcat Summer Camp, all of which happen simultaneously during the summer. The art exhibit in Point Reyes this month is photography by Inverness designer and builder, Paul Korhummel. As Paul explains it, he has visited "Big Pink" hundreds of times over the years, submitting plans and getting permits for his projects. With each visit, he saw new possibilities to compose interesting photos. The staff at Point Reyes is particularly interested in this beautiful exhibit since we too come and go from the Marin County Civic Center building all the time.
