



He is interested in making sure he knows how to do all the basic computer skills like email, copy/paste etc. He has been in the restaurant business but now is looking for a new career and needs computer skills. Our PC computer uttor was able to help.

- Stoff members consistently support people with questions on Internet workstations: "A patron wanted to print out a legal document, sign it, and then email or fix the signed version. He was comfortable with the first part of the equation but needed help with the scanner. He was delighted to see how simple the process was. He said something that really stood out to me: technology changes so fast, and he knows that advancements have been made and that certain things are possible, but doesn't know how to actually accomplish them. So he thanked me effusively for helping mediate that learning curve."


The lecture was a huge success, with overflowing crowds— enough that we had to schedule a repeat performance at the CMA Community Center!



After a brief question and answer period, Commissioner Fugazzotto thanked all the presenters for their presentations.

(8) OLD BUSINESS

- a. Commissioner Fugazzotto reminded everyone about this year's MCFL All Staff Day which is scheduled on Friday, September 23 starting at 8:30 am at the Osher Marin Jewish Community Center (JCC), 200 N. San Pedro Road, San Rafael. Anyone wishing to attend is asked to contact Edna.
- b. Commissioner Fugazzotto reported that we still have a vacancy in District 5. Director Jones commented that we got permission to fill this with a person 18 and under, and are hoping for a youth to fill this vacancy.

(9) NEW BUSINESS

a. Report on Measure A Oversight: Commissioner Fugazzotto reported that the Measure A Oversight committee had met prior to this meeting where we looked at the budget moving forward for the next 5 years, which at this point looks fine. We will need to keep an eye on controlling costs moving forward. Commissioner Javaras added that it was indicated that costs can be kept down with efficient management of future vacancies. Director Jones handed out a spread sheet which indicated that every dollar that came in for Measure A was expended, and where it was expended.

(10) PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR AUGUST

None – Director Jones routed a magazine from the New York Public Library, which President Kathrein asked her to share with Library Commission while she was visiting Italy.

(11) DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR AUGUST

Director Jones begin her presentation by distributing copies of the Bookmobile's monthly report which had accidentally been excluded from her report Sara also shared this month's BOS poetry reading for all to see. We will be sharing this with everyone in the reading folder. Sara hopes that everyone reads her report in its entirety and ask questions that may come up after reading report.

(12) ANNOUNCEMENTS

- Commissioner Schoen reported that the Friends of the Novato libraries would be hosting a Wine and cheese event on Sunday, September 25 with a presentation on the History of Novato given by docents of the Novato History Museum.
- Director Jones announced that she is really close to being involved with the Marin History Museum.

Sara Jones, Director of County Library Services Marin County Free Library Report For September 2016

Personnel

Final interviews for the Library Aide position at Fairfax took place at the Civic Center on Monday, September 19, 2016. Seven candidates were interviewed and the position offered to a current extra hire Library Aide, Ezra Herdocia. Ezra begins work in his new position on October 10, 2016.

The full time Library Assistant II vacancy at Fairfax was filled by a current employee, a Library Assistant I in the Novato branch. The employee, Erin Williams, began work at Fairfax on Monday, September 26, and discussions are taking place with Novato on how to backfill the Library Assistant I vacancy created by this promotion.

Eleven candidates were interviewed on September 9 for the Teen Services Librarian position at the Civic Center branch and the position offered to an applicant who currently works at Pleasanton Public Library. The new employee, Natalie Mallett, starts work with MCFL on Monday, October 10, 2016.

The accounting assistance vacancy still exists in MCFL's Accounting division and applications for extra hire employment are currently being reviewed.

All managers and supervisors have received training on TalentQuest, the new performance management platform, and MCFL will begin to use this software in October. The problems being experienced by employees whose work location was outside of Library Administration have been resolved. IST and MCFL technical staff worked together to create a login that works in all locations.

MCFL's All Staff Day took place on Friday, September 23, 2016, at the Osher Jewish Community Center on North San Pedro Road. The day was enjoyed by all and the day's theme, "Connect, Collaborate, Create' highlighted by speakers, presentations, and posters from the Maker Space, Sacramento Public Library, MCFL, and our County Administrator, Matthew Hymel. A follow up survey will be sent within the next few days to all attendees requesting feedback on this year's event and suggestions for All Staff Day 2017.

Library Activities:

Below are reports submitted to keep you abreast of library activities are directly related to our three primary goals from the MCFL strategic plan and the mission *to create connections to explore, imagine and innovate*:

- Goal 1- Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together
- Goal 2 Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression
- Goal 3- Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy
- Goal 4- Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning (new goal)

Outreach/ Bookmobile (Damon Hill)

The Bookmobile highlight of our September was delivering the giveaway books and bags of sports equipment to the 750 kids at our child development centers who participated in the Summer Learning-To-Go program. All of the kids got a book of their choice to take home and the centers received exciting new sports equipment for all to enjoy. The looks on the kids' faces were priceless as they found out the prizes were for them! All of the teachers commented about how in need of new sports equipment they were. One teacher said, "You don't know how much this means to us! We've been trying to keep balls inflated that have holes, are bald or just plain worn out. This is fantastic!" We asked each of the centers to send us some photos of the kids playing with the equipment and we hope to have those soon. (Goal 2- Support youth with opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

All Staff Day on September 23rd was a great event that took the All Staff Day committee months of planning to prepare for and Terry Jones had a significant contribution to the day. A highlight of last year's all staff day were the poster sessions----an opportunity for branches to share what they've been doing. Terry Jones and Damon Hill presented our new MOSS robots, our Strawbees and the Career Online High School program. It was a great opportunity to inform our colleagues about these programs and engage in some creative play. Damon authored an article for the Friends of the Library's *Library Leaves* to highlight the day activities. (Goal 1- Preferred place for children/families to connect, learn and grow together)

The bookmobile currently serves 5 assisted living facilities in Marin as well as the community of Rotary Village which mostly houses seniors. The services are well used and provide much needed access for seniors who do not have another way to get to the library. Our audiobooks are very popular with seniors, particularly those with vision problems. The new Playaways (self contained MP3 players) have really been embraced by our clientele. It is so much easier for those with vision challenges to use the Playaways instead of wrestling with multiple cds. Nicole Terry does a great job of connecting with the activity directors at the facilities and bringing materials to support their programming. At Aegis in Corte Madera, one of the activity directors is continuing a book club for residents that is being very well received. Nicole brings copies of their upcoming books and uses her reader's advisory skills to help with the selections. (Goal 4 Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Terry Jones went to a very well attended summit on Hunger in Marin with presentations by many groups trying to address this important issue. Libraries do often play a role in bridging the meal gap in the summer for kids receiving school meals during the academic year. It was a great opportunity to connect with other parts of our community and see how things might fit together. The Marin IJ wrote a very informative article on the day http://www.marinij.com/article/NO/20160901/NEWS/160909981 (Goal 1-Preferred place for children/families to connect, learn and grow together)

This year's Association for Library Service to Children held a virtual conference instead of their usual national institute. The conference had been scheduled in North Carolina and the group did not feel that they could continue in North Carolina due to the passing of controversial laws in the state. Members of the Children's Services Committee came together to view some of the presentations. We learned a lot and also sparked a lot of ideas about new things we might be doing. (Goal 2- Support youth with opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

Nicole Terry has gradually been glading the Bookmobile picture books so that we can more easily access the curriculum subjects for our child development centers. The process is well underway and will make it easier for our families to find favorite subjects as well. The "glade" choices mirror a lot of the subject areas that our child development centers teach so the project is worthwhile on so many levels. (Goal 1- Preferred place for children/families to connect, learn and grow together)


Career Online High School (COHS) is set to launch on October 3^{rd.} MCFL card holders will be able to obtain a high school diploma through the Library. Damon Hill completed online training, student interview training and a training in San Jose with other libraries who have introduced COHS. The program is being funded by the State Library of California and a matching grant from MCFL. There are a total of 10 scholarships available. Anna and Jen created a great launch page that details the program requirements at www.marinlibrary.org/diploma (Goal 4 Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

During the month of September a Measure A facility projects got under way. There was a Request for Proposal and site walks for potential bidders for the Fairfax Acoustical Assessment and the Novato HVAC study analysis. The proposals were received and evaluated with a winning firm identified for each by the end of September. Next step will be to negotiate a contract with the winner of each of the studies. Ideally initial analysis would begin on both in November. The 3rd project identified were the electrical upgrades at each owned facility. On September 23rd there was a walk through for potential bidders. The final proposals are due on October 9th and from there will go through a ranking process to identify the winning proposal. Damon Hill also presented the Measure A Facilities projects to the Measure A Oversight Committee on September 14th to highlight planned projects, budget and timelines.

Gail Grant has continued to work on graphic materials for MCFL. Gail has updated and ordered some swag items in preparation for the All Staff Day and upcoming outreach project. This included:

Our great success this summer was in large part due to the excellent team of 'tween and teen volunteers administering the Summer Learning Game. Kathleen sent certificates of accomplishment to all of the Dixie and San Rafael school district school. Often these certificates are as popular as the prizes.

Venetia Valley School returned for their annual library visit marathon. Visits will continue into October, as of the end of September Kathleen hosted visits of all of the 1st and 2nd grades. Kathleen will follow up with library cards in concert with the San Rafael Library. Staff and kids alike are delighted with super cute Snoopy library cards this year! (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together)

Kathleen has launched into the next phase of Mind in the Making Training. She and Sara Hathaway are working hard to finalize LTSA grant contracts and make arrangements for the Dec. 6-8th MITM train-the-trainer training that will happen for 30 MCFL staff. Kathleen and Sara were presenters at All Staff Day on this topic. Kathleen participated in the Association for Library Services to Children (ALSC) Virtual Conference screening at Los Gamos on 9/15 & 9/16. She felt It was wonderful to be able to listen to new ideas about inclusiveness, equity, and best practices for reading development and youth services excellence without having to leave town. Kathleen was joined by teammates Victor Avalos and Denise Mattos. (Mission – Create connections for our community to explore, imagine and innovate)

Kathleen successfully pitched an idea to Sara Jones to create MCFL branded book backpacks that will be provided to youth at the Jeanette Prandi Center. Kathleen worked with Gail Grant in Tech to ordered a branded bag and will be speaking with Kari Beuerman from Health and Human Services to find how to best partner on this project. This idea is an outgrowth from the book bags Kathleen created and provided to County Counsel. Kathleen was delighted to have Denise Mattos substitute for her very first Toddler Storytime while Kathleen was away. Feedback was that Denise is a true natural and Kathleen is so happy to have her assistance. The Brown Bag Book Club met to discuss Death Comes for the Archbishop by Willa Cather We had displays about Robert Redford (DVDs), Movies Based on Banned Books (DVDs), It's All a Mystery to Me!, September 11, and Banned Books. Linda organized and/or hosted Climate Change/Marin Master Gardeners. (Goal 4 – Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning)

Elmer provided a one-on-one patron assistance session in using an iPad to (a) configure the Maps app to plot directions, and (b) to take a photograph and attach to email to send. Linda revised portions of the SPOS manual to reflect MCFL changes: new catalog, website and Library Document Station. On September 21st Marin Academy instructor John Hutchinson brought 8 of his students to the California Room for a class visit to learn about the primary source materials used to research local history and to get some pointers on conducting oral history interviews. Librarian Laurie Thompson and extra-hire Archivist Dewey Livingston gave a joint presentation and led the Q & A. Over the next few months these same students will return to the California Room in pairs to conduct in-depth research on a topic of

local interest. (Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery & expression).

On September 28th, with the assistance of Ahmed's Movers, we moved 18 shelving units into our new Annex at Marin Commons to accommodate our "overflow" collection of 300 linear feet of books and documents,

currently stored at Technical Services. All of the books and many of the documents are listed in the MARINet catalog so we are pleased to have them accommodated on these new deep shelving units. Bolting the bookcases to the cement walls proved a bigger challenge than anticipated so we will have to complete the migration of materials from Suite 180 to Suite 182 on October 10th. On September 15th four members of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria who have recently opened the Graton Tribal Library met with Librarian Laurie Thompson to discuss gaining access to some rare materials relating to Miwok and Pomo heritage from the California Room collection. Corte Madera and Marin City (Julie Magnus)

Marilyn Wronsky, Librarian II for Children's Services, recently visited the Cove School's English Language Learners Parents Group. She described all the resources for kids and parents at the library, and how we have bilingual staffers and collections that support English and Spanish speakers. Marilyn has been working with Alice Franco of the Cove School to make sure we reach all the students and families in the area, and that they know that the library is here to help everyone succeed in reaching their educational goals. (Goal 1- Be the preferred place for children, families, and caregivers to connect, learn, and grow together.)

Sarah Butts, Librarian I for Youth Services, after taking an early learning and development class, has recently been reworking and refreshing our Mother Goose on the Loose program, which is aimed at the 0-2 age group, into Baby Bounce – with some of the old favorites, but with some new interactive components. She is adding a "Stay and Play" time after the main event, providing educational toys to engage our early

learners, courtesy of a generous donation from the Friends of the Corte Madera Library. (Goal 1- Be the preferred place for children, families, and caregivers to connect, learn, and grow together.)

Ana Stanescu, Librarian I, shares this experience: One little girl wanted a Snoopy card so desperately that she asked if she could just get her regular card replaced, and the entire time I was getting her new card she was gushing about how excited she was! She even stopped me from checking her items out at the desk because she wanted to do it herself with her awesome new Snoopy card on the self-checks!!!

In the course of a conversation about the impact of what libraries, and librarians, do for children, and the importance of reaching the milestone of grade-level reading by third grade, Sarah Butts, Librarian I, Youth Services, commented that "The time we spend reviewing children's and teen literature really pays off. We have recently made connections with new families that have been saying things like 'you were so helpful last time,' 'my kid is hooked on that series you gave him,' 'thanks for the help with my reluctant 2nd grader, she flew through the books you gave her...' We expect to hear this in the library, but the frequency is so gratifying." Creating a "book culture" and eager readers in the library means we are helping to create success for kids! Early learning and early reading are essential to building a strong foundation for life. (Goal 1-Be the preferred place for children, families, and caregivers to connect, learn, and grow together. Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

Our collaboration with the Corte Madera Recreation Center continues to be successful. Shereen Ash, Librarian II, Adult Services, reported that the fourth program in the Senior Seminar series she organized with the Senior Liaison from the Rec Center featured an orthopedic surgeon talking about the causes and treatment of joint pain. Forty people attended and the evaluations rated the talk as "excellent". We are still receiving calls from patrons telling us how much they appreciated the Advanced Planning presentation from last month, and many are signing up for our email alert list for future programs. (Goal 4- Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Local Marin Master Gardener, Joe Jennings returned for a presentation on fall planting. Again, a big hit, as relayed by Shereen Ash, Librarian II, Adult Services. Gardening

programs are a "go" at Corte Madera Library with lots of questions and interaction from participants. We are grateful to MMG for their generosity in providing these programs to the community. (Goal 4-Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Supporting patrons using the new catalog is giving staff the opportunity for longer, more involved conversations about the scope and power of our collection and services. After helping patrons create a username, setting up their preferences, and highlighting some of the great new features of the new online catalog, patrons are more often than not, thankful and impressed. Kim Turold, Library Assistant I, recently found that out, as she relates that "On Saturday I had a patron come up to me for the sole reason to tell me how happy he is with the new catalog. He said " it is much easier to navigate"." (Goal 3-Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy.)

Library Assistant I, Kim Turold, recently heard from a patron who shared how much she loved the "As Heard On NPR" display on our discovery wall, and timely access to books. She said she appreciated being able to come in to the library after hearing about a new book and finding it right away! Kim also shared that when she was showing another patron the bios-- she was talking about all the libraries she likes but "Corte Madera is the one she loves". (Goal 4- Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Sarah Butts, Librarian I, Youth Services, was having a conversation with a teen patron about finding some books of interest to read. Ana Stanescu, Librarian I, Adult Services, joined in the conversation, as it seemed that her expertise in this area of readers advisory might be relevant: the teen wanted sci fi and fantasy books that have lesbian romance where the characters' sexuality is incidental to the plot, but also with little graphic violence, and happy endings (especially no death of the lesbian characters). As it turns out his wasn't an easy request to fill, but Ana was able to put together a list of titles and links to resources and email it to her - and found some titles through LINK+. Ana shared that "Definitely one of those 'this is why I'm a librarian' moments: it felt really good to be able to help her find positive representation in her genre of choice." (Goal 2-Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

Tami Fehrenbacher, Librarian I, Adult Services, helped a student with a research question recently. The young middle school student, Lucy P., was looking for information for a History Day Project. She wanted information on a 1978 tree-sitting protest in New Zealand which led to the creation of Pureora Forest Park. Tami found some online sources of information for her, and also a book on the Pureora Forest that she could request through interlibrary loan. Tami emailed her all of the information on Sunday, and we got a very nice thank you note via email from the patron:

Dear Tamara, Ana, and Shereen,

Thank you so much for helping me find this information. I really appreciate it. The

Pureoran protests have not been documented as much as other topics, and it has been difficult to find informative written sources. I will look into the ones you recommended. ©

Thanks again!

Sarah Butts, Librarian I, Youth Services, has been bringing book clubs to the schools. She reports, "The preliminary meeting for the "embedded" teen book club at Kent Middle School went well on September 8, we also talked about library card month, our circulating Chromebooks, ebooks and audio books. The first official book club meeting is October 20 and we expect to have good attendance." (Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

MCI WebStar Misbah Mamoon's *My Place, My Story* film premiered at the Rafael Theater this month. She had participated in the week-long student short film-making project operated through California Film Institute in August, which was a girls-only session, and created an amazing video about tolerance and how important it is to learn about each other, free of assumptions. In fact, the Marin County Office of Education was so impressed with it, they are going to broadcast it throughout the school system. It will soon be available to view on the CFI website, http://cfieducation.cafilm.org/my-place-my-story/. (Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression. Goal 3- Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy.)

Etienne Douglas, Community Library Specialist/WebStar Coordinator, lent his considerable film-making talents to the All Staff Day Committee to create the infectious "Happy" video that captured the indomitable spirit of library staffers. The video was a huge hit at All Staff Day on Sept.23, and there has been interest from the County to use the video as a recruiting tool, with a little bit of MCFL branding added. You can check it out here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=pbMhRuKQsbw Etienne has mentored WebStars at the Marin City Library for years, teaching them about computers, digital editing, photography and film-making, and has also helped teach film-making in the My Place, My Story program that teaches digital storytelling to teens through the California Film Institute. Diana Lopez, Librarian I, has been attending community meetings and connecting with Marin Housing Authority. MHA had some grant money and were open to suggestions for how to spend it. Diana has been wanting to start a parent shelf at MCI, and she worked with Lewis Jordan and Cynthia Green from MHA to purchase about \$650 worth of books to get the collection started. These will include books about family literacy and helping children and parents deal with various challenges. (Goal 1- Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together. Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression. Goal 4- Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Adriel Ahern, Library Assistant I, reported that Project Daffodil http://www.projectdaffodil.com/ visited the library, sharing pop-up books with circuitry that help kids learn concepts such as circuits lit in parallel and in series, switches and resistors. We had 7 young patrons who were very excited to play with the interactive apps, pop-up books, and create their own pop-up, electric card. (Goal 1- Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together. Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

Teen patron, Leemaja T., a Marin City resident and freshman at Tam High, recently brought her WiFi hotspot in to renew it. She said, "Thanks, it's really helping me with my

homework." The WiFi Hotspot program is a unique effort to connect kids in Marin City who don't have Internet access at home, by providing them with a WiFi Hotspot device through the Library. The Library subscribes to the service through Verizon. It was funded by a grant from the Bank of Marin, the Marin County Library Foundation, and a private donor. (Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression. Goal 3- Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy.)

High School student, (and magician extraordinaire), Ethan S., began volunteering at MCI. He's quickly learning shelving and will be a great addition to our team. (Goal 2-Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

New Marin City resident, Parisa S., came in to inquire about community arts events. She is a filmmaker, with a series recently picked up by PBS. We told her about the WebStars and she said she would keep them in mind for possible future projects. (Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

Sarah Butts, Youth Services Librarian I, visited Mr. Edney's class at Bayside/MLK Academy to teach information literacy sessions with a focus on plagiarism. (Goal 2-Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

Dr. Griffin, the new Principal at Bayside/MLK Academy, emailed Diana Lopez, Librarian I, to ask about getting a book about notable Latinos. He wanted to honor Hispanic Heritage Month in his morning announcements at the school. He also asked if we could provide him with some images of notable Latinos. Diana asked John Elison, Library Assistant II, to work on this project, and he selected *Voices of Multicultural America* and *Portraits of Hispanic American heroes I* by Juan Felipe Herrera; paintings by Raúl Colón. He printed pictures of Sonia Sotomayor, Salma Hayek, Selena, Junot Diaz, Frida Kahlo, Oscar De La Hoya, Cesar Chavez, and Mario Molina (the chemist from Mexico who helped discover the ozone hole and started the research into global warming.) At a recent meeting at the school, Diana noticed that the pictures were on a bulletin board in the main office and that Principal Griffin was thrilled with the books. (Goal 2- Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression.)

A patron who uses the 3D printer donated \$40 to buy filament. (Goal 3- Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy.)

Carolyn and Margaret attended Association of Library Services to Children virtual institute Sept. 15-16 which was also attended by most of the Children's Services Committee. Some of the programs included:

• LGBTQ books and programs -- during this program, Adriel Ahern of MCI was able to use Bibliocommons to create a booklist of recommended titles which we have in our system, and Clara collected titles to order which MCFL doesn't own.

Staff have access to the archived versions of these workshops during the next year, and information for accessing them will be on the Children's Services intranet page. These topics will be discussed at the next Children's Services meeting and we'll develop actions to take as a result of the training. Staff told her about MCFL free downloadable eBooks, audiobooks, magazines and videos and she immediately signed up for a library card! Other patrons who received their cards at the Farmer's Market and at Streets for People have paid visits to the library this month. (Create connections for our community to explore, imagine and innovate). (Goal 3: Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy).



A speaker from Road Scholar presented a program about Cuba on September 21. 31 attendees, all seniors, viewed pictures and asked numerous questions about traveling to this "new" location. Patrons commented that this was an excellent and informative program. (*Goal 4: Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.*)

September 13, Bodhi Setchko, local author and musician, sang original compositions and read from his new book. 19 attended this peaceful and enlightening program during which Bodhi explained how to hear music around us all the time, and how to find the music within ourselves. (Goal 4: Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

Pajama-Rama returned to our branch in September, with stories and songs presented by Margaret. Kids enjoyed singing along, and are always fascinated by the autoharp. A parent commented at the end, "I'm going to tell all my friends about this!" (Goal 1- Preferred place for children/families to connect, learn and grow together).

Our continuing successful partnership with Sustainable Fairfax resulted in a Seed Saving/Seed Swap program on September 28. Master Gardener Laura Nicoletti explained seed saving to the small but dedicated audience who waited through a host of technical difficulties. Attendees shared ideas with each other, and everyone took home lots of seeds. (*Goal 4: Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.*)

With the recent addition of Playaway Bookpacks (book & digital audio kits), Marcia Stieger, Library Aide, rearranged collections on our mobile shelving, removing one display and providing an expanded area for Playaways and J Graphic novels. Playaways are now more visible, and appear to be circulating better. (Goal 1- Preferred place for children/families to connect, learn and grow together)

A regular patron told a staff member that last Friday a small crowd of people were waiting for the library to open at noon. A woman walked up to her and asked what was going on. The patron told her that everyone was waiting for the library to open, and the woman said, "Really?! It's not like this in Palo Alto." The patron told her "we love our library."

Anthony Puga, Circulation Supervisor, served on the All-Staff Day Meeting Committee during the year and was responsible for creating an incredibly successful day of enjoyment and information, including a presentation by Neshama Franklin, Library Assistant 1, about Marin Poets Live. WEBSITE IMPROVEMENTS

We were able to get a two month contract extension with Boopsie, meaning we will have until December 15th to transition users to the new app. We'll be posting lots of notifications to the website, in buildings, sending emails, and adding information to the current Boopsie app redirecting folks to the new app. We'll have a portion of our website dedicated to giving

download instructions and a Quick Start Guide and we'll remove Boopsie from the App Stores in mid-November. We will most likely set up a "light" version of the launch plan we used for the new catalog in July. (Goal 3 – Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy)

INTRANET UPDATES

The Leadership Team continues to assess and revise Policies, Procedures, and Forms brought over from the old Intranet in the hopes of eliminating old documents, updating current documents, and settling on one version of each document. Currently there are still different versions of these important resources floating around. Changes are made as we sift through the documents and are then "locked" so others cannot edit or otherwise alter the master version.

MARINet WORKING GROUPS

The Digital Resources Working Group (DRWG) and eBook Working Group (EBWG) both discussed Hoopla this month – how best to go about getting all libraries in Marin County involved as this would mean we could feature Hoopla in our catalog and also best serve our patrons, many of which do not understand why they cannot access Hoopla. Larkspur, San Anselmo, and Mill Valley do not have the service. Jessica is inquiring about lowering the pricing threshold to make this doable for the 3 remaining libraries. The DRWG also discussed further additions/subtractions to the current lineup of resources. We are the limit budgetwise and some libraries are concerned about low usage of expensive resources like Brainfuse (Live Homework Help). MCFL sees very large numbers for Brainfuse, but other libraries don't (yet); this may be due to the fact that MCFL has been offering Brainfuse for a couple of years and it's just last year turned into a resource through MARINet, so other libraries' patrons may not know about it. We discussed ways to promote what we already have and a schedule was set up for monthly promotion assignments among working group members. (Goal 3 – Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy)

OTHER PROJECTS

Indie Author Day, sponsored by and in support of Biblioboard's Self-E, will feature a full day of events at the Corte Madera Library on October 8th. Shereen has been working on getting a roster of authors for panels and individual presentations and Jen will show off Self-E and is handling promotion of the event. Representatives from the California Room will be featuring local resources that can help authors create accurate settings in fiction and conduct research for non-fiction work. We expect patrons of all ages as there is indication that teens in the area are interested in self and online publishing. (Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning, Goal 2 - Support youth in our community with opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

Initial conversations about **eBooks on the SMART Train** took place via conference call in late September – participating were representatives from MARINet, MCFL, San Rafael Public Library and the Sonoma County Library system. We'd like to make use of the captive audience aboard the wifi enabled trains, hopefully supplying them with tangible take-aways like an eBook or a learning resource such as Lynda.com that they can use while on the train. MARINet is looking into how this would work with our current vendors and staff from libraries are investigating

other commercial options. (Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning, Goal 4 - Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning)

Acquisitions (Vanessa Walden)

Technical Services Acquisitions group welcomed a new team member – Nathan Kelly – formerly of the South Novato branch library. We were pleased to add another staff member and begin training on all the various tasks that help keep our libraries running smoothly – receiving new materials, paying invoices, and managing the Distribution Center.

Vanessa Walden presented a poster at All Staff Day to re-introduce staff to collectionHQ, which is a collection development tool that helps libraries manage the ebbs and flows of floating collections. It also assists with many other collection development tasks including identifying items in poor condition that are suitable for recycling, moving items to other locations where they will be better used by patrons who need them, and materials budget allocation planning to ensure we are purchasing the materials our patrons want most.

Vanessa Walden visited with the West Marin staff at their monthly staff meeting to kick off the last phase of glading picture books. Once complete, a significant portion of the picture book collection at all of our branches will be sorted by genre to improve browsability by both kids and adults. (Goal 2: Support Youth in our Community with Opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

Michelle Hirsch continues to work with the California Room staff helping them to manage the archival collection and will soon be assisting them in the new California Room Annex at Los Gamos. (Goal 1: Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together)

In August Mildred met with the acquisitions team to enhance the way in which holiday books are stored and retrieved from the MCFL Distribution Center. The solution that was decided upon centered on using specific subject headings to navigate through the materials. As the principal cataloger, Mildred worked on a list of approved subject headings. The improved methodology makes pulling out holiday books a faster task which in turn positively effects how quickly those items can be sent to the branches during specific holidays. Having holiday materials ready at the branches is an important service that the library provides to families, children and caregivers to connect and learn with our heritage and history. (Goal 2: Support Youth in our Community with Opportunities for self-discovery and expression)

In September Mildred and Silvia Molina helped Anna Johnson develop the Spanish section of MCFL's new website. New carousel and lists inform users of the library's variety of Spanish and bilingual resources to facilitate the discovery of our materials.

In September the selectors and acquisitions team implemented a new process by which holds are placed on patrons' suggested purchases. Previously, patrons were instructed to check the catalog periodically in order to place holds. The new process offers a new level of service to patrons by making it easier for them to access materials. It also encourages patrons to submit suggestions which enhances our collections with patron-driven acquisitions that keep a pulse on the needs and interests of our users.

Mildred continues to work closely with MARINet and the UXWG after the implementation of the new catalog BiblioCore. She continues to test, report and troubleshoot any issues as well as implement fixes. When needed Mildred has made recommendations to change existing practices in order to make the public and internal catalogs work better together. All the enhancements that Mildred has spearheaded augment the patron's digital experience by boosting the accuracy of the catalog and improving user access.

Mildred and Clara McFadden, as eBook selectors, are now regularly attending meetings for MARINet's EBook Working Group (EBWG). In doing so they are keeping abreast of the digital needs of the consortium as well as increasing fulfillment of patrons' digital requests. Likewise, maintaining a high digital collection refreshment rate, keeps the collection interesting which is reflected on the increasing number of checkouts. All of this in turn enhances MCFL's fostering a positive environment for digital usage.

In September the selectors along with MARINet improved the way in which materials requests are handled. Previously, it was a manual and laborious process that took a lot of MARINet and MCFL staff time. The new process eliminates many steps and allows selectors to use a feature within BiblioCommons to respond to patrons' requests directly. More importantly, patrons are able to check instantly whether their suggestions have been approved or not. This process makes use of existing digital tools to nurture digital literacy and savvy.

With the help of Jen and Anna we were able to update the MCFL Poet Laureate website with Prartho's remaining schedule of readings, the new logo and some additional information. (Goal 3: Be a positive environment for mobile and digital literacy)

West Marin (Bonny White)

At the September meeting of the Tomales Bay Library Association, "Crazy Science" teacher, Cheri Leierer presented a proposal to continue teaching her popular class at the Point Reyes Library. TBLA gratefully accepted Cheri's proposal and so Crazy Science resumed in September. I'm not sure what they're doing at this September class (Jennifer says, "blowing things up!"), but I'm very glad they were doing it outside. Cheri has now been approached by the Fairfax

Library so her classes may eventually be offered there as well. (Goal 1 - Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.)



Musician and historian, Marc Black visited the Point Reyes Library on Thursday, September 15 to lead us on a musical exploration of the 50s and 60s, complete with a sing-along. This popular program was funded by the Tomales Bay Library Association and one patron loved it so much she came into the library the next day and made a donation to TBLA. On September 23, MCFL staff came together at the Osher Marin Jewish Community Center for our annual All Staff Day. We were joined by County Administrator, Matthew Hymel and John McLeod of the Community Education Center. West Mariners Jennifer Livingston, Ann Bertucci, and Bonny White were members of this year's All Staff Day Committee. Throughout the year, Ann was the committee scribe, keeping us all on track and for the second year, Jennifer Livingston took responsibility for all the catering and food, including a delicious breakfast, lunch choices to fit every diet, and afternoon snacks. Kudos to all! Our new LAI, Larisa Proulx, was so inspired by All Staff Day that she has already arranged a crafts event, using one of the "Program in a Box" ideas presented and volunteered for the Social Media Committee.





On September 28, Point Reyes Library welcomed Library Commissioner and former Park Ranger, Loretta Farley. Loretta came to help the $4^{\rm th}$ grade class from West Marin School get free one-year passes to our National Parks. This is our second annual "parks pass" visit from National Park Service personnel. (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.)



On September 28, Sara Jones joined Bonny White and Amanda Eichstaedt for their weekly Swimming Upstream show on radio station KWMR. The occasion was our annual celebration of Banned Books week. Every one of our Coastal library branches had a great banned books display during the week of September25-October 1.Sara's expertise and comfort in discussing this vitally important topic were very evident and very much appreciated by the many West Mariners who tuned in. During September, our new West Marin Literacy Coordinator, Annemarie Russo, began to learn the various parts of the program. She made flyers for our Bolinas, Tomales, and Point Reyes ESL classes, delivering them to ELAC, Cafecito, and Baby Gym meetings to make sure we reached the right people. Our Bolinas class, under the leadership of teacher Camilla Ford, has already started. Point Reyes, Tomales, and San Geronimo classes are all poised to launch the first week in October. Annemarie's next task is to compile lists of former and current students, teachers and tutors for a fall event. (Goal 4 – Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)

In addition to teaching ESL in Bolinas, Camilla Ford will also be our West Marin story time provider this year. With her contract signed, she is now in contact with local teachers and childcare providers, setting up schedules and preparing for classes in all four West Marin communities. (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.)

Volunteer teacher Carol Sweig's popular class, *Memoir: Writing from your Life* has resumed for a second 6-week run. Once again, students are raving about the class after just one session. Participants say that Carol nurtures wonderful dialogue, encouraging people to be vulnerable in a safe space. Novato Library is now inquiring about have Carol teach there as well. *(Goal 4 – Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)*

Way back in 2008, a group of us from Point Reyes came up with an idea for a cultural exchange called *La Mesa de las Abuelas*. Roughly, translated, it's a potluck where you bring and share dishes your grandmother made. At the time, we thought it would just be a nice way to encourage dialogue and friendship amongst people from different cultural backgrounds. Every couple of years some of us get together, under the leadership of West Marin Community Services, to do it again. This year, the theme was "Communication." To demonstrate where

communication can break down, we played a very funny game of "telephone," in English and in Spanish. There was also a powerful skit involving a "patrón" and a ranch worker. Every time we do "La Mesa," I come away more encouraged by the obvious desire of our community to get to know and appreciate one another. (Goal 4 – Support adults through life stages with opportunities for self-development and independent learning.)







On September 29, we welcomed back bilingual story time at the Bolinas Library. Last year we weren't able to find a provider, but now, things have changed. Before we hired her as LAI at the Bolinas Library, Camilla Ford was extra-hiring aboard the FLAGship. Her Spanish language skills came in very handy there and now she will use her skills to teach bilingual story time. (Goal 1 – Be the preferred place for children, families and caregivers to connect, learn and grow together.)

Meeting called to order at 9:02 am

I. **Public Comment Period.** No one from the public was present.

- II. Introduction of Guests: None
- III. Approval of minutes from 7/21/2016: Motion to approve the minutes, as corrected, from the July 21, 2016 MARINet Board Meeting. Motion by Brenda Brown. Second by Linda Kenton. Motion passed unanimously.

IV. Old Business

- a. BiblioCommons update:
 - i. Staff and personal accounts Jessica Trenary brought to the attention of the Board that, if library staff people add information to their personal Bibliocommons accounts on where they work, their position at the Library, etc. that that information is viewable by patrons. Conceivably there could be some patrons who might view this as an official library account, rather than a personal account.
 - **ii.** Switching all links from Encore (Sept. 2 shutdown) Dan informed the Board of the date chosen to shut down the Encore interface and change all of the existing links to Encore on the MARINet website.

- iii. The mobile app (\$6,000 cost) The Marin County Free Library (MCFL) is interested in moving away from their current Boopsie mobile app to the mobile app available from Bibliocommons. Is the rest of MARINet interested in using the Bibliocommons app as well, branding it as MARINet and evaluating whether to include support for the annual app charges in the MARINet budget for FY 2017-2018? (MCFL is willing to pay for the first year's fees for the app.) After discussion, Scott Bauer moved that the Board support having MARINet as whole use the app, branding it as MARINet and evaluating whether to include support for the annual app charges in the MARINet budget for FY 2017-2018 during the approval of the FY 17-18 budget. Seconded Joan Garrett. The motion passed unanimously.
- iv. Suggest a purchase issues (2 systems or 1?) Jessica Trenary described for the Board how, with the introduction of Bibliocommons, there are now two ways that patrons can make purchase suggestions through the Classic Catalog Sierra interface or through links that are throughout the Bibliocommons interface. MARINet staff has been collecting the requests from these two location, looking up which library is the home library of the patron making the suggestion, and forwarding the suggestion along to selectors at the home library. This is a time consuming process and since the introduction of Bibliocommons the amount of purchase requests has approximately doubled.

Jessica suggested three proposals to help deal with this workload:

- Suggestion 1: Place the suggestion form to a less obvious place in the Classic Catalog, this would decrease (though probably never to zero) the work of monitoring the Sierra system for purchase requests. The Board agreed to revisit this suggestion in two months, after the Bibliocommons catalog has had a longer period of use by patrons.
- Suggestion 2: Have the selectors at each of the individual libraries be the ones to look at the purchase suggestions in the Bibliocommons interface This would have the advantage that a Library could look at the requests at any time they want, and take some of the workload off of MARINet staff. This was agreed to by the Board.

• Suggestion 3: In Bibliocommons, patrons can indicate which library they prefer to use, and this information is displayed when they submit a purchase request. Rather than looking home libraries, the selector for the preferred library that is displayed can assume that the request came from one of their patrons and will be the one to evaluate the purchase request, saving the time that would be spent checking for home library in Sierra. The Board agreed that this approach would be fine.

Jessica will send an email to the Board to get a list of the selectors to be given access to the Bibliocommons suggestions. MARINet will also offer training for the selectors.

b. CENIC:

The Pickleweed Library connection will be through AT&T the first year (they were low bidder).

Discussion of MIDAS issues with libraries leaving MIDAS for CENIC. Anji Brenner suggested a letter signed by all the directors in support of the move; Dan McMahon will ask for a letter if it should become needed.

Sarah Houghton asked Dan if the new wireless system being installed with the CENIC project will be able to provide usage statistics (which the current MIDAS wireless system is unable to provide.) Dan indicated that yes it would.

c. NorthNet Grants for CENIC Libraries

Dan McMahon asked that each of the MARINet public library members fill out the grant document sent to him from NorthNet. Directors should send the completed form to Dan who will then send them all to Jacquie Brinkley of NorthNet.

d. 25th Anniversary of MARINet - update

The passport document has been proofed, minor corrections made and is about to be sent to the printer. An initial print run of 10,000 was proposed, at a cost of around \$6,000 with a 2-3 week lead time needed before finished copies are delivered. Anji Brenner suggested that it would be better to start with a lower number of copies,

perhaps 5000, and then reprinting if needed. Anji also suggested Strahm Communications/Alpha Graphics as a possible source for a second quote. Motion – Sarah Houghton motioned that MARINet be authorized to spend up to \$4,000 on up to 4,000 copies. David Patterson seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

e. Discards and Weeding - Centralize?

Thrift Books pilot. Abbot Chambers to send a test box of weeded books to the Marin County Free Library for inclusion in their pallet of books being shipped to Thrift Books. Abbot and Scott Bauer will report back on the test at a later meeting.

In both cases one of the pool of online card numbers is marked as used even though no card gets issued. Jessica is working with the vendor on the problem.
