

- (8) PRESIDENT'S REPORT NOVEMBER –Sue thanked everyone for all the work they had done during the year.
- DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR NOVEMBER Welcomed everyone and (10)did a round of introductions for the staff and presenters in attendance. 



Bolinas

Former teacher and current volunteer Jeff Deitchman brought Cookie Time by Jessie Sima to life for an enchanted group of young readers. The story of two girls building a time machine to speed up cookie baking inspired our Reading Buddies to let their imaginations soar. With simple cardboard boxes, they crafted their own time machines, filling the community room with laughter and creativity. The excitement proved that all you need is a story, a box, and maybe a cookie or two to spark boundless possibilities.

Novato

In October, the Novato Library introduced the Messy Mayhem Craft Club, held on the first Thursday of each month from 3:30 to 5:00 p.m. This ongoing program celebrates creativity with no set projects—just an abundance of craft supplies and endless opportunities for exploration. Families have embraced this joyful space where kids are encouraged to make messes and focus on the fun of creating, rather than perfection.

Civic Center

The Civic Center Library brought the community together with a series of vibrant outreach events. Highlights included a captivating performance by Perry Yan the Magician and the heartwarming Marin Girls Chorus Winter Concert, both of which delighted audiences of all ages. The Library also expanded access to resources through the San Rafael Library card drive and MyCard Outreach program, connecting with families at Glenwood Elementary, Coleman Elementary, and Sun Valley Elementary Schools.

The Learning Bus

The Learning Bus offered children the chance to explore independence and creativity with a hands-on cooking activity. Using child-safe knives, they sliced apples and later mashed their cooked slices with smashers to make their own applesauce, engaging all their senses in the process. Later in the week, families joined for the beloved annual Pajama Party Potluck and a screening of The Snowman. Dressed in cozy sleepwear, they shared food, laughter, and the magic of a timeless story, celebrating the warmth of community.

Corte Madera

The Children's area at the Corte Madera Library featured beautifully curated holiday displays, now showcased in a newly expanded display space that rotates themes every two weeks. This larger setup allows for more interactive and visually engaging displays, giving families fresh reasons to explore and enjoy the library with every visit. Meanwhile, the popular Legos and Crafternoons programs continued to thrive, with families dropping in for impromptu crafting sessions, including designing festive holiday sweaters. Despite ongoing construction, the library remains a lively and welcoming hub for families, with rooms bustling daily.

The Bookmobile

The Bookmobile brought joy to Nicasio School during a recent outreach visit. Jesse's son, John Gannon, made a new friend, Brooklyn, during his first visit on the bus. The day was made even more memorable when Nicasio principal Barbara Snekkevik stepped aboard after the students to say hello, further strengthening the Library's connection with the school and its community.

Teen Services

Corte Madera

This month, the Corte Madera Library became a vital resource for local students during finals week with its After-Hours Study Hall. For four consecutive nights, the library stayed open late to provide a warm, welcoming environment where teens could collaborate, study independently, and find encouragement. Each evening, 25-30 students filled the space, fueled by snacks and pizza to keep their energy up. The atmosphere was a blend of focus and camaraderie, offering a supportive setting for students to prepare for their exams. Adding to the festive spirit, the library's display wall featured sparkly snowflakes created by the teen advisory group, bringing a touch of winter magic to the space. While photos of the study sessions were sparse, one snapshot of students enjoying pizza captured the week's joyful and productive energy—a reminder of the library's role as a space for academic success and connection.

Civic Center

At the Civic Center Library, music and creativity took center stage this month. On December 6, Rebecca organized a magical evening under the dome featuring the Marin Girls Chorus Winter Concert. Performers ranging from kindergarteners to high schoolers delighted the audience with songs in multiple languages, celebrating the diverse traditions of winter holidays. Following the concert, attendees enjoyed a festive cookie decorating activity, adding a sweet and creative finale to the event.

Continuing its commitment to teen outreach, the Civic Center Library visited Terra Linda High School on December 13. In collaboration with school librarian Ms. Rose, Sommer and I led a watercolor activity for 25 teens, providing a relaxing and engaging creative outlet. During the session, we introduced library resources and teen volunteer opportunities, with three students expressing interest by taking applications. These programs demonstrated the library's dedication to fostering creativity, culture, and meaningful connections with local teens.



The South Novato Library's Community-Led Curation Initiative evolved through the involvement of Spanish-speaking patrons and partners such as the College of Marin, Hamilton School, Loma Verde School, and the Multicultural Center of Marin. In parallel with this community-focused approach, the library hosted a variety of events that celebrated creativity and collaboration.

Sponsored by the Friends of the Fairfax Library, one workshop guided participants in making small, handmade books—perfect for personal writing or photos—and another event, the Repair Fair, brought together local volunteers and specialized fixers to mend lamps, small appliances, electronics, clothing, and bikes. Poet and filmmaker Josh Berry visited the Inverness Library, where he read original poems from Perfect Folds In a Ragged and Torn Sea and screened short films that highlighted his creative process. Meanwhile, Margot Koch offered a six-week meditation series, inviting both beginners and seasoned practitioners to practice sitting meditation and share their experiences.

Each of these past events underscored the library's commitment to inclusivity, learning, and sustainability—fundamental values that fueled the Spanish collection curation initiative. From expanding awareness of Spanish-language materials to partnering with Reuse Alliance and Zero Waste Marin for waste-reduction programs, every aspect of these efforts supported broader equity and anti-racist goals. By combining shared ownership of the collections with diverse offerings—such as bookmaking, repair tips, poetry, and meditation—the Marin County Free Library demonstrated what it means to be truly community-centered: empowering patrons, celebrating their stories, and offering resources that help everyone learn, grow, and create together.

Collection Development & Management

The Collection Development Team is gearing up for important initiatives in January 2025 to enhance the management of MCFL's floating collection. Using tools such as CollectionHQ, Popular Author Transfer, and Rebalance Pull, the team will address challenges like "droughting" (when branches have too few materials) and "pooling" (when branches have too many). These efforts will ensure a more balanced distribution of materials across all branches, improving access for patrons countywide.

In addition, the team is redesigning the public reconsideration form and creating a new staff-specific version to better respond to materials challenges, ensuring a more thoughtful and transparent process for addressing feedback about the collection.

Another highlight this month was Adult Materials Selector April Harper's participation in a San Quentin Library Listening Session, where she provided new adult book selections as giveaways for residents. The purpose of these sessions is to hear from residents about their engagement with their current library along with ways to partner more deeply with MCFL as a resource. This meaningful engagement underscores MCFL's commitment to providing equitable access to diverse materials in all corners of the community.

Looking ahead, the Collection Development Team will begin hosting monthly Collection Conversations in January. These sessions will invite MCFL staff to engage with the collection more deeply, fostering collaboration and shared ownership of the Library's offerings. Through these initiatives, the team continues to ensure that MCFL's collection remains dynamic, responsive, and inclusive.

Educational Equity







The Shop at the South Novato Library

This year, The Shop significantly expanded its outreach efforts, connecting with local public schools and introducing new users to its innovative programs and resources. Special visits to area high schools resulted in increased teen engagement, including the first-ever teen-specific event at The Shop. This milestone program welcomed 20 teenagers, ages 15–17, who experienced hands-on opportunities to explore creativity and technology in a supportive environment for the very first time.

Currently averaging 20 users per day, The Shop continues to grow as a hub for creativity and connection. Targeted outreach remains a priority, focusing on Novato community members aged 14-35. By building relationships intentionally, The Shop aims to provide lasting opportunities for learning and engagement.

This semester, The Shop's Library Technology Program Coordinator led outreach efforts that brought library resources and hands-on learning directly to schools and community groups. In September, San Marin High welcomed 125 students for an engaging session, while Laguna School hosted 12 enthusiastic participants. October brought two visits to Mary E. Silveira School, reaching 45 students on the first visit and 28 on the second. Hamilton Elementary also participated with 30 eager learners, and Novato High School introduced five students to The Shop's offerings.

In November, outreach expanded further with four visits to Helix School, working with six students per session. At the same time, Novato Charter School hosted eight visits, engaging 10 students per session. By December, The Shop revisited Helix School for a final session with six students, while San Marin High welcomed 175 participants. The semester concluded with a special outreach event for Troop 104 Girl Scouts, where 26 young participants explored creativity and technology together.

Each visit was more than an introduction to resources—it was an opportunity to spark curiosity, build relationships, and empower young learners with tools to succeed. These outreach efforts exemplify The Shop's mission to foster equitable learning opportunities and meaningful connections throughout the community.

West Marin

The Book Scouts pilot program at West Marin School concluded mid-month, wrapping up a successful semester of after-school literacy support. Coordinated by Mattie Ivy Leeds and Alex Porrata, the program served 16 students in grades 1-4 with weekly sessions featuring independent and small group reading, celebrations of Latino and Native American Heritage Months, and a collaborative letter-writing activity to an author.

At the Stinson Beach Library, early December brought whimsy with the Stuffy Sleepover. Children brought their beloved stuffed animals to the library for an overnight adventure. Under the watchful eye of the "staff bear," the stuffed animals got up to mischief, from reading books to crafting, with photos capturing their antics.

The Bolinas Library continued to thrive with engaging children's programs led by Vanessa and Lily. Weekly Lego Club on Mondays and craft activities on Wednesdays kept families coming back, while special Saturday pop-up storytimes added extra excitement. Meanwhile, in Inverness, regular storytimes for TK, Kindergarten, and first-grade classes wrapped up for the season. Caroline's lively sessions delighted young readers, especially with the introduction of the library's new mascot, Snowball, a fluffy white puppy puppet that charmed the children.

Marin City

In December, the Marin City Library reflected on a month of impactful events and transitions. A powerful social justice author event, featuring the People's Commission for Integrity in Criminal Justice, drew attention to the current state of California's criminal justice system. Centered around the memoir of an incarcerated artist, the event left a lasting impression on attendees.

The library also hosted a festive holiday party at Golden Gate Village. Families participated in holiday crafts, a gift-wrapping station, and the beloved Book on Every Bed initiative, which provided books to build home libraries in partnership with the National Book Foundation's Book Rich Environment program. A whimsical "Christmas Pumpkin" decoration captured the joyful spirit of the event.

The month ended with a heartfelt goodbye to longtime staff member Faheem Bassa. Starting as a Webstar intern, Faheem rose to become a Supervising Library Assistant, serving the community with dedication for over a decade. His contributions shaped the branch into what it is today. Mabrook, Faheem!

The Lab

The Lab, also known as the Marin City Makerspace, continues to grow, welcoming new users each week. In preparation for an anticipated move to a larger space in January 2025, the team is excited to expand its offerings. A partnership with the newly completed Marin Horizon School will bring additional opportunities for collaboration.

Looking ahead, The Lab is preparing a Black History Month project in partnership with St. Andrew Presbyterian Church. This makerspace initiative will celebrate and honor Black history, providing a meaningful platform for learning and creativity.

These programs and initiatives highlight MCFL's dedication to educational equity, fostering creativity, and connecting communities through meaningful experiences.



December was a vibrant month at Marin County Free Library, filled with impactful programs, meaningful events, and engaging resources that brought our community together. From celebrating cultural traditions to creating opportunities for learning and connection, we delivered services that inspired and supported patrons across Marin. Guided by our mission of equity and inclusivity, these activities reflected our dedication to fostering spaces for growth, reflection, and joy.

In our blog series, we highlighted the Most Popular Book Titles in Marin for 2024, the Best Books of 2024, and explored cultural holiday celebrations alongside the history of winter solstice traditions. Across social media, we spotlighted the Marinship Legacy exhibit in all branches, promoted the Kids' Cooking Workshop and the My China Roots heritage tool, and shared moments from Grandmothers Feed Us Love, a soul food event that celebrated community and culture.

Events brought even more opportunities for engagement. The Hope Housing Community Choir performed at the Civic Center Library, and patrons participated in a reflective Write a Letter to Yourself activity. Students benefited from free legal advice provided in partnership with the Marin County Law Library, and the Homework Helpers program continued to support academic success. Live music by the Forget Me Knots String Duet and the Marin Girls Chorus brought warmth and celebration to the season.

Special initiatives rounded out the month, including gift ideas from The Book Place (sponsored by the Friends of the Library) and the South Novato Repair Fair, where patrons had the chance to repair and reuse cherished items. Throughout December, our programs and resources were thoughtfully tailored to meet the needs of Marin's diverse community, fostering learning, connection, and celebration at every turn.

- Celebrated spring with over 300 partners and friends at our annal Primaveras celebration in Novato
- Shayla Davis, Community Library Specialist based in the Sausalito Marin City School District won the, "I Love My Classified Staff Award" from the California School Library Association
- Received a \$12,000 grant from the California State Library to offer "Lunch at the Library" in
 which kids participate in library programming and receive free books to take home while
 having a free lunch in the summer. This was the first year that Marin County Free Library has
 received this grant and participated in this program

- II. Public Comment Period None
- III. Business Topics
 - A. Approval of Minutes from Previous Meeting (*Action*) **Adlawan moved to approve the**September 5, 2024, meeting minutes, Gilbert seconded. Avalos abstained; the
 remaining members unanimously approved through a voice vote.
 - B. Board Resolution: Dominican Services Alignment (*Action*) Kenton moved to approve Board Resolution No. 002-2024, Adlawan seconded. Gilbert abstained; the remaining members unanimously approved through a voice vote.
 - C. FY25-26 Budget Plan (*Discussion*) Trenary further clarified the proposal, which would split the MARINet budget into "core" and "elected" services, allowing the affiliate members, College of Marin and Dominican University, to opt-out of elected services, CENIC, LINK+, Overdrive and online resources.
 - D. MARINet One Year Plan Update (*Discussion*) Trenary reviewed the progress made since the Staffing and Structure Recommendations report was delivered one year ago, on Nov. 2, 2023. The Board thanked Trenary for her work on each of the task forces and the progress made thus far.
 - E. Board Task Forces Updates (Discussion)
 - Board Support (Duran, Kenton, Brenner) The Annual Retreat is scheduled for Thursday, December 5th from 9 am to 2 pm and will include lunch. Eric Meade, Whole Mind Consulting, will be facilitating the board working session. The Board would like the Executive Committee or Board Support Task Force to look more closely at the ways in which Board Members can coordinate or collaborate with each other on programming.
 - Staffing Task Force (Adlawan) Marin County has posted the open position at MARINet - Technology Systems Specialist III (TSIII). The position closed to applicants on October 30th. Trenary worked with County HR to write job


description information and minimum qualification questions. She created a list of websites for County HR to promote the job. She also worked with County HR to write "round 1" interview questions. She will oversee the process as the hiring manager, working with County HR.

- Organization Restructuring (Adlawan, Quffa, Hill, Gilbert) The group continued work on the FY25-26 Budget Plan proposal and discussed the timing of moving forward with MARINet's "Commitment to Equity" plan.
- Collection Development (Brenner, Frye, Adlawan) –Trenary notified the DRWG she will be collecting information around digital spend from them in a survey.
 She will work with selectors at each library to get more information about collection subject specialties and foreign languages purchases. As well as gathering information on their workflows for purchasing eContent.

IV. Standing Agenda Items

- A. Equity Commitment to Equity Plan (*Discussion*) The Organization Restructuring Task Force is asking to think about MARINet's commitment to equity when working on project prioritization at the Annual Retreat in December.
- B. Systems Administrator Report (*Discussion*) Trenary shared the progress made in the CENIC refresh project, which needs to be completed by calendar year 2024. She noted assisting Corte Madera and Dominican to reopen and helping San Rafael close and reopen in their pop-up location.
- C. Library Announcements (Discussion)
 - Frye College of Marin has several exciting programs coming up:
 - Barksdale Homecoming Nov 4-9, 2024: The LibGuide includes history on Don Barksdale, the documentary, and a list of Homecoming events.
 - o Ada Limón COMmon Read Events:
 - Umoja Nature & Poetry Walk November 14, 2024
 - Poetry Reading with English Department November 20, 2024
 - Engaging Native American Perspectives Speaker Series: They've had two panel discussions this fall (recordings included on the LibGuide). Stay tuned for more events over the next year!
 - Avalos San Rafael is closely watching Measure P election results. The
 Downtown construction is moving along and planning for Pickleweed's remodel
 is in progress. They have started programming at the temporary pop-up location,
 and they are receiving a lot of positive feedback from the patrons about the

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space. The library has also been able to engage with the community in new, positive ways in the temporary space.

- Gilbert Dominican will be holding programs around NaNoWriMo (National Novel Writing Month). Gilbert will share more details as they are available.
- Brenner Mill Valley is pleased to be moving forward with the purchase of assistive listening devices. The library has several exciting programs, including some on AI and robotics, scheduled soon. They are still exploring the possibility of purchasing a locker. The library continues to see a steady increase in visitors despite recent changes to parking laws and the availability of nearby parking spaces.
- Duran Belvedere Tiburon recently coordinated with <u>Exhibit Envoy</u> and recommended them to libraries needing assistance with exhibits. Duran noted that MARINet may want to consider applying for a regional training grant from CLA, which is up to \$5,000 to offer training to other libraries. Duran shared she is joining the CALIFA and CENIC Boards.
- Jackson Sausalito has a new zip books-like program called Pikabooks. Sausalito has shrunk their books on CD collection and streamlined some workflows.
- Hill Larkspur was contacted by the Marin IJ so that they could cover their upcoming art programming. The new library project continues to move forward.
- Kenton San Anselmo expanded their Library of Things collection. They've been focusing on local authors programming. They're considering a bi-annual Annual Night of the Poets, since it's so popular.
