Brown Act:

The legislative body of a local agency may use teleconferencing in connection with any meeting or proceeding authorized by law. Cal. Gov't Code §54953(b)(1). A "teleconference" is "a meeting of a legislative body, the members of which are in different locations, connected by electronic means, through either audio or video, or both." Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b)(4). A local agency may provide the public with additional teleconference locations. Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b)(4).

The teleconferenced meeting must meet the following requirements:

(1) it must comply with all of the Act's requirements applicable to other meetings;

(2) all votes must be taken by roll call;

(3) agendas must be posted at all teleconference locations and the meeting must be conducted in a manner that protects the statutory and constitutional rights of the parties or public appearing before the body;

(4) each teleconference location must be identified in the notice and agenda and each location must be accessible to the public;

(5) during the teleconferenced meeting, at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body must participate from locations within the boundaries of the body's jurisdiction; and

(6) the agenda must provide the public with an opportunity to address the legislative body at each teleconference location. Cal. Gov't Co).

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF COUNTY LIBRARY SERVICES, LANA ADLAWAN

Greetings, Library Supporters and Friends -

As we head towards a busy summer, we also wind down the library's fiscal year and we have much to report on. The library issued a countywide community survey in late 2021, early 2022. We gathered more than 5,000 responses and followed up with conversations in each of our branches, including numerous oneon-one meetings with me. I learned so much from those meetings as your new Director of County Library Services and continue many of those conversations today. As a library system, we are always looking for ways to listen and respond to our community, and we did just that as a result of our community survey.

Community Survey December 2021 - January 2022 **Community Chats** March - June 2022 Response to Community Now - December 2022

As we completed our listening sessions, each library team reviewed community feedback and created goals in response. We tried out new goals, changed them, threw goals away and listened to community again to better hear the needs. As we worked through this exercise, staff and priorities changed, which also impacted goal creation and completion. Where we landed as a result of this positive, iterative process is included in the pages of this report. The Marin County Free Library team is dedicated to excellent service, and we are proud of this work in coming together as a team in response to your feedback. Partnerships

The branch focused on expanding partnerships in their area and were very successful in connecting, even during the COVID-19 pandemic. They strengthened partnerships with existing partners, such as the Marin Master Gardeners and local schools, pop-up library spaces in the local laundromat, and formed new partnerships, such as providing services to kids with developmental differences at the Golden Gate Regional Center. The branch also focused on partnerships for older adults, such as the Alzheimer's Association of Northern California, The Integrated Clinic, and Sisters in Crime.

Marketing

The branch wanted to make popular materials more attractive for patrons, so they created a new graphic novel and periodicals location, and relocated their popular classics collection to make it more visible. They added new signage throughout the branch, creating interactive displays such as library bingo game and added more thematic monthly displays in the front entry way. The branch also prioritized facing out titles throughout the library, to encourage browsing.

Fairfax Goals

Community Seed Exchange

In the Community Survey conducted last year, Fairfax received more comments to bring back the Seed Exchange than on any other topic. This service fits well with our goal to become a resiliency center and encourage sustainability practices. We have received donations of seed packets from 6 different seed companies; Friends of the Fairfax Library supported shipping costs and have agreed to purchase additional seeds. Of the 474 packets we received, 343 have been taken by patrons!

Bilingual Storytime

Our goal is to serve Spanish speaking families, and we started offering programs every other Saturday in February. We are planning to start offering Bilingual storytime weekly in August!

Promoting Services on Social Media

Fairfax library now has Facebook, Instagram and NextDoor accounts. Our Instagram account has 372 followers, and we receive "likes" for photos of our displays, notifications of our programs, and progress on the Library garden project. With the help of Library Marketing we are now sending out a monthly Savannah email to Fairfax patrons about our events and services.

Promote Awareness of Library Services

Staff was looking for a way to spread the good word about our programs and services. So many times we talk with patrons who have no idea of the many wonders of their public library. Thanks to the beauty and ease of Instagram (and the dedication of a few staff members who are clever and savvy), Novato Library grew a fan base of over 932 followers in a very short span of time. Although most of our 412 posts are about library programs and the promotion of programs & services, these two campaigns were a bit more whimsical and are two of the most liked Instagram posts of all.

Conduct a Novato Community Needs Assessment

The MCFL patron survey completed in early 2022 and the follow up Community Chats revealed a lot about the wants and needs of our patrons. To learn more, Novato created an interactive wall for our patrons to continue to share their responses to questions (asked in English and Spanish) like: Why Did You Come to the Library Today? What have you discovered at your library? How could your library experience be improved? Some common themes emerged.

Novato staff learned that our patrons love us as much as the books and materials we provide, but missed some of the regular programs that we'd been offering prior to the pandemic, including kids storytimes and creative programs, museum docent talks, craft programs, book clubs, tech help.

And we're happy to report that what Novato wants, Novato gets, as we've been steadily adding back all the programs that they missed.

Make Services More Accessible and Convenient

During the pandemic, MCFL made great strides in bringing the library to the people by way of curbside services, Book Bundles for kids and Personalized Picks for adults. Once our doors reopened, Novato wanted to continue to offer ease of service and deliver materials in safe and convenient ways to our patrons.

Our children's librarians and staff engaged in a complete overhaul of their room and collections. New low shelving was installed to increase sightlines and open up the space and collections were shifted to make finding things easy and intuitive. The room now flows the way a reader grows! Spanish picture books now have a front and center location as you walk into the room.

Adult librarians and staff then repurposed some of the old children's room shelving to create monthly displays highlighting important parts of our collections for patrons to see upon immediate entrance to the library. The books in this ever-changing collection fly off the shelves. We also gave our classic titles a shelving unit of their own, as they are one of the most requested items from students and adults alike.

South Novato



South Novato Goals

Improve Services to Spanish Speakers

Reading Buddies Spring 2023: Finalized another successful semester of Reading Buddies including our first bilingual cohort in partnership with Dominican University.

Primaveras (April 14th – 15th): Our first bilingual outreach initiative collaborating with the Novato Branch to celebrate and honor the diverse Latinx diasporas and Spanish speaking communities. Primaveras represents the symbolism of life, flourishing, and above all the resilience of our communities. The events and activities were all bilingual with an emphasis on Spanish. Our branch strengthened and established new partnerships.

Events

Soccer with the Penguins; Dominican University Women's Team

We jumpstarted our Primaveras celebration with community building playing soccer with the Penguins, Dominican University's Women's Soccer team. The SNO team (yellow) won 9 – 5 against The Makerspace team (orange). Reading Buddies student Gisele scored 5 goals. More than 30 NUSD children participated teaming up with parents and DU players.

Opening Ceremony: Colección Liberación

Opening ceremony for our Colección Liberación (Collection Liberation) and Spanish language collections at South Novato Library honoring leaders in our communities, for their efforts in providing services for Spanish speaking and Latinx descent communities. (Organizations represented by community leaders included Dominican University, MCFL Spanish Services Working Group, San Rafael Public Library, North Marin Community Services, Rotary Club International, and Raising a Reader).

Primaveras Celebration

The final celebration of the festival happened on the big lawn of the Novato branch. There were several bilingual storytimes, a Drag Story Hour and music provided by Chulita Vinyl Club and catering by Tacos El Cuñado.

South Novato (Continued)



Perform School Outreach and Deepen Relationships with Teachers and Families

Art with a Purpose: A series of 4 Art programs led by Teen Leadership Crew member Sofia Casano. Sofia gave a short presentation at the start of each program discussing an important social issue (including the LGBTQ+ movement, our oceans and the environment, bullying, and cultural diversity) before leading families in a related art project.

NUSD Library Card Project: Every student in the NUSD system will receive a card that is linked to their student ID number. Youth Services Librarian Rashida Skaar and Extra Hire Librarian Jennifer Livingston visited Hamilton School to distribute the first batch of library cards to students

Outreach and Class Visits: Youth Services Librarian Rashida Skaar and Spanish Services Community Library Specialist Héctor Garcia host class visits from Hamilton School every Friday. They worked with Kerry Bacho of Raising a Reader who has been taking the visiting classes on a journey to countries around the world! Kids had a chance to listen to a story and music, learn fun facts, make art, and play a game from each of the countries. Afterwards, they got passports stamped to show the places they "visited".

Reimagine, Rebuild and Reopen Makerspace

The Makerspace in South Novato has been busy the last few months in completing outreach, assessing community need, and forming new partnerships. Outreach to local schools and participation in class activities have been successful, as well as new partnerships with the Marin Humane Society, North Marin Human Services, Fun with Academics and Divine Electric. The Makerspace is excited to reopen to the public this summer, with new branding and a changed focus.

Webstars:

- New Hires: Hired three new teens to work in the Makerspace (and Library)
- Total Interns working and building in Makerspace currently – 7
- Total Interns fully trained on tools and appliances currently - 5

Rebuild and Reimagine:

West Marin Goals

- 1. Provide technology help in English and Spanish to adults and older adults in conjunction with broader MCFL programs and partnerships.
- 2. Conduct an audit of physical spaces to ensure a safe and welcoming environment for everyone, with a focus on user experience and accessibility.
- 3. Partner with local schools to issue library cards to all students.

Provide Tech Help in English and Spanish for Adults and Older Adults

Point Reyes created regular bilingual tech help hours on Thursday evenings and Friday mornings. Demand is high for this service and ranges from help with basic assistance with email and wifi connections to more advanced inquiries regarding personal electronic devices such as phones and laptops. All West Marin locations have made a concerted effort at digital literacy instruction and do so on a daily basis.

Conduct an Audit of Physical Spaces

- Point Reyes Library ensured that dim lighting and nonworking light fixtures were corrected before daylight savings time ended, ensuring that the library was well-lit and welcoming for all. Point Reyes also got a new clock with larger, high contrast numbers on it.
- Bolinas Library relocated a self-check machine that was blocking a pathway and opened up access to the service desk.
- Inverness Library installed and relocated a "book drop" (outdoors materials return) which is now ADA accessible. Inverness also eliminated a messy "flyer table" and created an up-to-date attractive bulletin board with current community information.
- Stinson Beach created colorful, topical signage for school children who were visiting and working on a nonfiction reading project.

West Marin (Continued)



Partner with Schools to Issue Library Cards to All Students.

Tomales Elementary School: 146 library cards were issued to students in grades K-8 for the first time. Point Reyes Library staff created physical cards, provided a packet of information and had a day of instruction for teachers and students on the use of the cards, highlighting the libraries digital resources for students in a rural and remote area.

Bolinas-Stinson School: Stinson Beach Library partnered with the first graders and coordinated a series of visits to the public library. Students created art based on the books they read, which culminated in an exhibit at the library. Bolinas and Stinson libraries are on track to issue library cards to all students (K-8) by the end of this academic year. Bolinas library staff also regularly attends a new Cafecito at the school, increasing parent engagement with the library.

Nicasio School: In addition to all K-8 students receiving library cards, students had regular visits by the Bookmobile and separate visits by Senior Librarian Madeline Bryant, who shared books, literacy activities and library information with all grades.

Community Schools (Shoreline Unified): Library staff played a key role as a community partner by participating in planning meetings for the Community Schools grant application, identifying key areas of focus for implementation. Those areas are Chronic Absenteeism, Family Engagement, Safety, and Social and Emotional Health. Finance, Accounting, and Human Resources (FAHr)

FAHr Goals

- 1. Prepare a list of FAHr staff outlining their job duties to help staff know whom to contact for questions.
- 2. Create Parcel Tax informational documents to provide patron support in English and Spanish.
- 3. Update all FAHr forms, policies, and procedures.

Staff Matrix for Job Duties & Contracts

Completed! The team recently designed a workflow that clearly communicates which members of the team to contact for Finance, Accounting, and Human Resources needs. The new matrix will be shared with all library staff in June and posted to Backstage.

Parcel Tax Supports in English & Spanish

The Senior Library Parcel Tax Exemption & Contiguous Exemption application forms and parcel tax information on MCFL's website are all NOW available in both English & Spanish. The Senior Library Parcel Tax Exemption application form has also been updated to make it ADA accessible.

- Assess needs for non-traditional kits in conjunction with public services staff, including system communication of goals and projects.
- 2. Coordinate RFID implementation for MCFL's collection, supporting ongoing tagging, deployment of readers/sensors in branches, and planning for an automated materials handling system.
- 3. Complete application of shelf-ready processing (from Baker & Taylor, Midwest Tapes) to the majority of MCFL's collection.

Add Non-Traditional Kits to Meet Community Needs

Be responsive to branch/system goals in adding nontraditional items/kits that meet community needs and library goals. Work on system communication of goals and projects.

Some recent examples of unique items and projects to support adding them to the library:

- Tec Services, Tech Support and Marketing staff have collaborated on preparing for installation of a new laptop lending kiosk pilot at the Novato Library, which kicked off in May.
- Support for a new community art lending project has meant collaboration between Tec Services, Public Services, and eServices with the project team to create a way to include artwork records with images in the catalog. Projected time-frame for lending art to the community is later in 2023.
- In response to community interest, we've begun a pilot project of circulating video games from 6 branches as we track popularity and possible expansion.

RFID Implementation

Completed! The next part of the project to begin is the installation of the Automated Materials Handling Machine at Technical Services.

Shelf-Ready Processing

The majority of adult, teen, and children's materials are now arriving with processing directly from the vendors. This decreases the amount of time from purchase to library borrower.
