Brown Act:

The legislative body of a local agency may use teleconferencing in connection with any meeting or proceeding authorized by law. Cal. Gov't Code §54953(b)(1). A "teleconference" is "a meeting of a legislative body, the members of which are in different locations, connected by electronic means, through either audio or video, or both." Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b)(4). A local agency may provide the public with additional teleconference locations. Cal. Gov't Code § 54953(b)(4). The teleconferenced meeting must meet the following requirements:

(1) it must comply with all of the Act's requirements applicable to other meetings;

(2) all votes must be taken by roll call;

(3) agendas must be posted at all teleconference locations and the meeting must be conducted in a manner that protects the statutory and constitutional rights of the parties or public appearing before the body;

(4) each teleconference location must be identified in the notice and agenda and each location must be accessible to the public;

(5) during the teleconferenced meeting, at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body must participate from locations within the boundaries of the body's jurisdiction; and
(6) the agenda must provide the public with an opportunity to address the legislative body at each teleconference location. Cal. Gov't Co).

LIBRARY ACTIVITIES AND OUR EQUITY FOCUS

Children's Services



Children's Services Team has been busy creating a funfilled and engaging summer for kids in Marin! Over 1,500 free books have been distributed during targeted outreach events. Each child attending a Park library trip received a free book, and outreach was also made to laundromats, farmer's markets and schools serving low-income children.

The Adventure Journal, available in English and Spanish, has been successful enough to require a second printing, and an estimated 4,000 have been distributed to children countywide. The Journal provides space for children to track the number of minutes they are reading, encourages them to learn new skills and explore their town, and offers the Ultimate Adventure: read a total of 1,000 minutes.

Branches have offered summer programs for children and families that educate, entertain and engage! Spanish and Mandarin bilingual storytimes, crafts, STEM, Park Ranger-led programs, Lego, musicians and Wildcare - all have drawn crowds to our libraries and elicited positive responses from attendees.

The Marin IJ covered the Wildcare program at Fairfax "Fairfax Event Puts Wildlife Within Reach for Children" and included great photos!

Teen Services



Fairfax encouraged teens to read this summer by creating a Teen Summer Reading Game. There were twenty different prompts that teens could choose and these prompts were supported by booklists on bookmarks. Teens that were shown the summer game really seemed to like the corresponding bookmarks to give them book recommendations. Staff also enjoyed the help with recommendations for teens. This reading game was also well received by the county as a whole and made available for all MCFL libraries to use.

Novato has been busy for the last couple of months! We started June off with Study Hall for the teens to come and have a quiet place to study complete with snacks. During the summer months we offered our Level Up Gaming Club twice a month. On the first Tuesday of the month teens could come to the library to play their choice of one of our Nintendo Switch games. The second Level Up meeting is on the last Saturday of the month with staff picking the game. This is a great way for teens to meet new friends and sometimes work together within the game. On June 30th we celebrated the release of the new Indiana Jones movie by watching the classic Raiders of the Lost Ark.

In July, we watched Ghostbusters: Afterlife, Goonies, and Shang-Chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings. We also had a teen interested in starting an Entomology Club. The teen brought in her entomology boxes and demonstrated how to preserve the insects. We then colored butterflies, cut them out and pinned them to a small Styrofoam block.

Adult Services



Fairfax Library has started a Beginning Mindfulness Meditation series in July. Two instructors from Spirit Rock Meditation Center are leading weekly drop-in classes geared toward people with any level of experience. Sitting in a circle, Louije and Ari lead the group in an hour of conversation and guided meditation. By providing this space the Library and the presenters have created an opportunity for a community of intent, a safe space for people to talk about their experiences with meditation and any difficulties they are working on. The patron response has been gratifying, with a group of between six and 12 people returning each week. They are looking into continuing to offer the program in the fall.

Corte Madera Library began exhibiting the photographs of Tom Benoit in the Friends of the Corte Madera Library Community Room on July 15. The exhibit entitled "Luminous Light" will be on display through August 15. Tom Benoit began his pursuit of the black and white "Fine Print" in 1973 when he saw some of Ansel Adams' prints. He studied with Ansel Adams' last assistant, John Sexton, and with noted San Francisco photographer Ruth Bernhard. He is always in pursuit of images that "glow" with that special light. The images which were selected for this show represent some of his favorites.

Stinson Beach Library also had the pleasure of having the artwork of Judy Molyneux on their walls. Her "Beach Dance" art show was on display through July 31.

UC Marin Master Gardeners Jenine Stilson and Keri Pon presented "Edible Flowers: Beyond the Beauty" at Novato Library on July 13. They discussed which flowers or parts of flowers are safe to eat and, also, some that you should avoid, covering ornamentals, herbs, flowers of fruits and vegetables and even weeds, and offered creative ideas on how to use them.

Corte Madera offered two online programs this month and one inperson program. Bob Mauceli of the Marin Master Gardeners provided an in-depth presentation on backyard birds and bird habitat. His lectures are informative and thorough, and he offers a resource list that is emailed to attendees who request it. San Francisco Fine Arts Museum docent Kathryn Zupsic gave a fascinating presentation on the life of Jane Austen as represented through art in the museum, sharing paintings that Austen herself would have seen such. Topics discussed included fashion, country estates, and gardens, and societal changes during Austen's time. Both of the programs were presented online to 41 and 44 people respectively.

Executive director of Marin Villages, John Powers, and volunteer, Alice Joyce, gave a talk at the library and answered questions about how to get involved with Twin Cities Villages, our local chapter of this nationwide program to an interested group at the library. The discussions carried on past the program's end.

On June 15th Marin City Library hosted another in-person film event titled Against All Odds: The Fight for the black Middle Class. Library visitors were able to watch the film and had an opportunity afterwards to participate in a Q & A session with Journalist, Bob Herbert, the documentary's creator!

Etienne Douglas, Marin City's Makerspace and Webstar Coordinator, had the privilege to attend the National Coalition of Blacks for Reparations in America (N'COBRA) to talk about Marin City Library's ongoing book and documentary display regarding reparations for Black Americans. The Reparations Display at Marin City was the result of a community listening session held by N'Cobra and Marin City Library patrons as a way to provide vital information about the need and moral imperative for reparations for the black community here in California.

Collection Development & Management

Collection HQ Moving Along

All locations have been actively inventorying their collections to ensure that what we have on our shelves matches what we have registered in our catalog for patrons. Our goal was to complete this process in August 2023, and we will meet this goal! This was an incredible task to complete given the number of items to review and I am so pleased with all our branch teams and our selectors for accomplishing this!

Collections Workflow

MCFL's selectors recently created a new process to accept ideas from all levels of staff for improvements and changes to systemwide and individual branch collections. They also created a survey form and an approvals process so that ideas can be reviewed in a timely manner, approved, and then placed in a queue for implementation. It was important for both our Public Services and Support Services teams to have a more efficient workflow to more easily share ideas and figure out how to accomplish these goals within the technical work specifications of a modern library. This new process will be shared with all library staff in August.

New Year, New Budget, New Materials!

A new fiscal year makes all our selectors very happy. We increased the collections budget by \$89,000 this year, targeting increases to ebooks, adult collections, and materials for children in multiple languages. One of our exciting projects this year is to create a staff working group to identify materials in other languages for children. Once these materials are established, we will look at adding materials for other age levels. Last month we ordered \$26,000 in econtent for adults, which includes patron hold requests, new/hot items, forthcoming releases, and Lucky Day titles. Educational Equity



South Novato

The Shop, the new community creative space at the South Novato Library, had its long-awaited opening on June 24th. After a brief tour and demonstration to an audience of 25 people, we were finally ready to host regular drop-in hours. Attendance has started low, but with long levels of engagement. Many people have come in to complete a variety of projects throughout the day. Different ages and interests determine most of the projects, but all the tools have been getting their use in by the public.

The South Novato Webstars have been continuing their training and development to be independent employees that add to our mission and values. They have been very supportive in building and programming while adding an unparalleled level of creative thought to better The Shop.

We've also hosted our first partner program, with the Marin Humane Society. Kids came into The Shop and made cat habitats and a doghouse. More on the way along with a variety of community programs, the first to be on August 12th called "Summer Kites."

Marin City

Marin City Library was thrilled to host MCFL's Learning Bus and community partners like Golden Gate Parks, First 5 and Marin Food Bank for our annual Play! / iJuega! Event on June 15th. Local families, preschools and day-care groups were treated to lively storytelling, music and movement by Storyteller/musician Mariela Herrera, as well as a giveaway of brand new backpacks with lunchboxes, free books and school supplies. Over 175 backpacks were given away to families with 141 people in attendance!

New Marin City branch manager, Rashida Skaar, Makerspace/ Webstar coordinator Etienne Douglas, and Library Director Lana Adlawan staffed a table at Marin City's Juneteenth Celebration where they were able to distribute over 100 childrens and teen books, and 60 ExploraStory Kits that emphasize African American Achievement and Black culture. Families at the event participated in live music, delicious foods from black culinary traditions, black owned small business stalls and, of course, lots of love from their local library!

Summer is a busy time for the library, and this year has been packed with all sorts of exciting events, new services, and new launches.

Our team supported Summer Adventure for kids and teens by bringing the Adventure Journal to life, developing and producing the idea of Novato librarians into an engaging and fun booklet in English and Spanish. We created a Teen Adventure design to coordinate with the Kids' version. The journal's design motif was the basis for our digital signage, web pages, events, posters and social media to promote participation during the summer, encouraging kids to read and explore! We highlighted staff-curated summer booklists for kids and teens.

MCFL's goal is to reach every kid in Marin to give them the opportunity to read during the summer, even if they can't get to the library. Our Reading on the Ranches program makes this happen through the efforts of the Learning Bus, the Bookmobile, and volunteer interns that connect with farmworker families. Recently, our efforts were recognized in School Library Journal's article "Going the Extra Mile: Equity in Summer Programming." (bit.ly/3DEsGrv)

We also helped highlight the amazing efforts of the Learning Bus, in partnership with First 5 Marin, to distribute hundreds of Summer Learning Backpacks and lunch bags to youngsters throughout the county, sharing fun, storytimes and joy in English and Spanish!

Just in time for the Fair, we provided snazzy new Marin County Free Library t-shirts to our staff and partners to spread the word in English and Spanish, black and blue.

We communicated about the roll-out of new services and openings, which was the culmination of much preparation by staff on the different projects.

Thursday, May 4, 2023

Adlawan called the meeting to order at 9:32 am.

- I. Roll Call/Determination of a Quorum
- II. Introduction of Guests No guests
- III. Public Comment Period No public comment
- IV. Approval of Minutes from Previous Meetings (*Action*) Chambers moves to approve the March 2023 and April Special 2023 meeting minutes, Kenton seconds.
 Unanimously approved by a voice vote.
- V. Business Topics
 - A. MNet Financial Update (Discussion) Trenary gave an overview of the state of MARINet financials, particularly focusing on actuals from FY22-23. Trenary explained variances from last budget cycle. Chambers asks if CENIC bandwidth bills will continue to be dramatically reduced. Trenary says she will investigate and provide more information about long-term CENIC plans at a future Board meeting. Chambers thanks Trenary for the detailed report.
 - B. Innovative Product "Quick Click" (Action) Tokutomi would like MARINet to subscribe to Innovative's product, "Quick Click" which will push order records into Sierra with one click from B&T and other vendors. Kenton asks about current problems with load tables. Trenary says the Sierra loaders are currently being updated by Dan McMahon, and the updated loader can be used for Quick Click ordering. Tokutomi says this product will save technical services staff time. Chambers says it may reduce the time between ordering and records appearing in the catalog. More research needed by Trenary to determine if this will help Dominican. Trenary will connect with Real at DUC. She will also add him to the BSWG email list. Duran motions to implement the product from Innovative, for a one-time fee of \$3,000 paid for using PYFB, Chambers seconds. Unanimously approved by a voice vote.



- C. June Meeting CLA Conflict Postpone to June 8th (Action) Adlawan says the California Library Association is June 1st, thus a conflict for members of the Board. Chambers suggests holding the June meeting in person at Los Gamos.
 Duran motions to postpone the June MARINet Board meeting to Thursday, June 8th in person at Los Gamos, Kenton seconds. Unanimously approved by a voice vote.
- VI. Standing Agenda Items
 - A. Collaboration/Partnership (Discussion) -

Sharing Summer Reading Materials – Each library discussed their summer plans including summer reading programs.

MNet App Self-Checkout Feature – Adlawan says MCFL is promoting this new feature and they created nice promotion materials. Trenary says there are known issues for certain phones. Kenton says she will connect with her staff with Trenary that are having trouble with the feature. Trenary will provide more information about circulation statistics collected through the app in the next System's Admin report.
