- (5) OPEN TIME FOR PUBLIC EXPRESSION No member of the public.
- (6) ANNOUCEMENT / BOOK RECOMMENDATION(S) No announcements. This month's book recommendation was from Nick Javaras. Nick spoke about the book *The House of the Spirits* by Isabel Allende.
- (7) READING & CORRESPONDENCE FILE Materials were sent to the Library Commission prior to meeting.
- (8) PRESIDENT'S REPORT – Glynda thanked everyone for their attendance and welcomed them to a new month. Reminding the commission to think about continuing to do good work and what is important, thinking about what we (the commission) can do to help those in our community who need to be uplifted and supported. She mentioned Marin Organizing Committee (MOC) that meets every month to support housing, immigration and other issues affecting Marin. If membership wanted to know more about it to speak with her after the meeting. She asked the commission to think about 'what keeps you up at night' to possibly write that down during the month as something to speak about during the meetings and to be the best civic selves and best commissioners of our libraries. She spoke about the open commission spaces and the 3 vacancies, asking for help for those in the districts with openings to speak with their communities and bring forth possible new memberships. She thanked everyone and to keep doing the good work.
- (9) DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR October Lana wanted to keep her report brief but highlight the work around the food insecurity response the library had and the full team getting the word out. The other item she wanted to mention the West Marin Vehicle project and how that was a goal for 2025-26 fiscal year and that project is on track. This vehicle will be very flexible for the community and there had been a lot of community input into that new project. The commission was reminded about the free training with Freedom Lifted and we will be sharing more information this month.

a. Library Commission Packet & Attendance – Commission voted to keep printed packets but decided that color was not needed except for necessary items such as excel spreadsheets. Discussed possible bylaw changes regarding attendance- no action taken. Regarding the attendance bylaws this will be brought forward to a future meeting. b. At the end of the presentation there was time for the commission to ask questions and give comment.





AutumnFest is now over and the new winds of November have swept in to seal in the tone of change — the air got cooler, and the trees a little more bare than before. Still, across the county, our libraries and outreach teams continue to deepened partnerships with schools, senior communities, county departments, and local organizations. Quickly organizing into action, from conty-wide food distribution support to bilingual literacy training, teen-led STEM programs, multicultural celebrations, and author talks, the Library continued to expand opportunities for curiosity, creativity, and connection grounded in the values of the Anti-Racism & Equity Strategic Plan.

Storytimes and crafting to nature education, writing workshops, and community ofrendas honoring tradition and memory, gave people a place to feel joy and a sense of belonging. Staff collaboration across branches demonstrated the power of collective action, while outreach efforts extended critical resources to seniors, people in recovery, unhoused youth, and families seeking support.

This is our story, and this is how we got here.

PARTNERSHIPS, PROGRAMMING, AND OUTREACH

Deep Partnerships that Reinforce Bonds

Bolinas continued close collaboration with the Bolinas Community Center and Bolinas Stinson School, reinforcing the Library as a youth gathering hub. Civic Center joined Health and Human Services, Fire, and Parks to distribute 121 food boxes at Kerner Campus and met with the County Assessor-Recorder to explore shared services. Corte Madera expanded partnerships with the Stanford Blood Center, BluePath Health/Marin 9to25, local schools, and Drawbridge to support teen and family engagement. Novato worked with local buisiness to post flyers for AutumnFest. They also met with Novato Dental Care to explore partnering on National Children's Dental Health Month programs during the library's refresh closure.

Fairfax celebrated 15 years of collaboration with Gan HaLev and the Jewish Community Library of San Francisco. Inverness worked with county departments to provide food support to SNAP-impacted households. Library Beyond Walls strengthened ties with Eden Housing, the Institute on Aging, Centers for Domestic Peace, and Transitional Aged Youth serving organizations. Point Reyes partnered with Parent Services Project to deliver bilingual storytime training to staff and promotoras. South Novato worked with the Public Authority of Marin to reach more than 100 attendees and collaborated with parents to distribute "Know Your Rights" kits.

Cultural Celebration is Intergenerational Learning

November programming showcased cultural celebration, as a method of intergenerational learning. Bolinas offered Book Scouts, storytimes, Mending Mondays, crafts, and after-school clubs that made the branch a favorite space for local youth. Civic Center delivered a robust lineup including an Indigenous Peoples' Film Series, mushroom foraging, an author talk, Fall Fest, writing groups, book clubs, and a Marin Girls Chorus performance. Corte Madera provided STEMfinity, Drawbridge crafts, Dungeons & Dragons, Puzzle Swap, storytimes, and its first Sunday movie.

Fairfax featured mushroom education, ADHD-friendly organizing, Drawbridge crafts, and the Stewards of the Land art reception. Inverness hosted pumpkin contests, bilingual storytimes, book discussions, and programs like Save the Newts and Introduction to Mushrooms. Novato brought back Knowledge-A-Bowl and Homework Helpers had 33 students attend and 8 teen volunteer tutors! Library Beyond Walls offered book clubs, technology help, and read-aloud visits, issuing 29 new Library cards. Point Reyes hosted Book Scouts and welcomed Peruvian illustrator Cocoretto. South Novato expanded youth programming through Dungeons & Dragons and a bilingual poetry celebration. Stinson Beach maintained community connection through its book club.

Working Outward

Civic Center provided art programs at Terra Linda High School, hosted Venetia Valley first graders, and refreshed the Marin Community Clinic's children's area. Corte Madera engaged families at the Health & Wellness Fair and supported food drives and early-grade classroom visits. Fairfax reached every class at Lagunitas Elementary and continued kindergarten outreach. Novato attended the Elementary and Middle School Assemblies at Good Shepherd Lutheran School to present library cards and materials. Library Beyond Walls engaged seniors, people in recovery, and supported-living communities through presentations and tabling efforts. Point Reyes strengthened bilingual early literacy by leading Colors of Spanish training. South Novato reached families through the North Bay Children's Center Fall Festival. With its building temporarily closed, Stinson Beach continued serving patrons through weekly Bookmobile visits.



THE GEARS THAT DRIVE US

Joyful Learning

Joy, curiosity, and cultural connection shaped learning experiences across MCFL. Bolinas welcomed a 2nd-grade field trip and continued to grow its lively after-school community. Civic Center expanded its writing workshops by offering guidance on the publishing process. Corte Madera encouraged discovery through Read to a Dog, seasonal displays, scavenger hunts, and interactive teen-led boards. Fairfax patrons enjoyed hands-on mushroom identification games. Inverness offered bilingual storytimes, nature learning, and programs celebrating wildlife and seasonal traditions. In Novato, Watercolorist and retired architect, Bo Bi, taught patrons basic watercolor painting. Library Beyond Walls supported joyful exploration through personalized tech help and read-aloud activities. Point Reyes advanced bilingual early-literacy learning through Colors of Spanish training. South Novato's makerspace inspired hands-on creativity, including parent-led restoration projects for local children.

Collective Impact

Highlighting MCFL's interdependence and commitment to shared goals, Bolinas' after-school engagement illustrated the importance of shared youth spaces, while Civic Center refreshed over 100 multilingual books at the Marin Community Clinic. Corte Madera deepened school partnerships through wellness events and outreach. Fairfax built community connection through a Día de Muertos ofrenda. Inverness staff served as Disaster Service Workers for West Marin food distribution. Novato staff served as Disaster Service Workers to distribute emergency food. Library Beyond Walls collaborated widely to ensure access for seniors, unhoused youth, and supportive-housing residents. Point Reyes staff supported other branches during their refresh, demonstrating system-wide cooperation. South Novato led efforts to establish MCFL as a food donation collection site, increasing countywide access to essential resources.

Community Power

Across the system, branches uplifted cultural identity, shared memory, and local leadership. Civic Center created an ofrenda that welcomed contributions from staff and patrons. Fairfax highlighted Latine and Indigenous land stewards through a youth-led climate action art exhibit. Inverness mobilized quickly with county partners to support SNAP-affected households. Novato Library re-launched their Teen Volunteer program. Library Beyond Walls empowered residents through technology support, resource presentations, and access to tools like astronomy kits. Point Reyes strengthened regional ties through a professional exchange with the Petaluma Library. South Novato partnered on toy drives, cultural displays, and youth-led creative projects that celebrated Latinx community voices.

These efforts reflect a Library system deeply rooted in equity, belonging, and community strength.

THE STORIES THAT SHAPE US

Across Marin, patrons shared moments of gratitude, delight, and discovery that highlight the personal impact of Library services.

At the Civic Center Library, patrons celebrated both programs and small, meaningful interactions. One visitor expressed joy at rediscovering childhood songs during storytime, while another praised the storyteller as the highlight of her grandchild's week. A father and son bonded over old Terra Linda High School yearbooks in the California Room, turning a simple browse into a shared family moment.

At Corte Madera, patrons voiced appreciation for friendly service and convenient features. One caller declared staff their "favorite people in the world," and another thanked the Library for auto-renewal while working through an 800-page novel. Children and teens enthusiastically filled interactive displays, scavenger hunts, and seasonal bingo cards, demonstrating how passive programming turns the branch into a lively creative space.

In Fairfax, a mother shared that her 10-year-old son loved the graphic novel Lion Dancers so much he joined a local Lion Dance group. Another visitor wrote, "Always informative, whatever program," after attending the Stewards of the Land art show.

In Novato, patrons expressed how much they enjoyed the watercolor class with Bo Bi, and 6th graders from San Jose MS visited the library to check out staff recommended in Book Talks outreach at the school. At Inverness, Pumpkin Guess contest winners expressed joy and gratitude, and many Point Reyes patrons — visiting during the PRE refresh — remarked on their surprise and appreciation after returning to the branch for the first time in years.

Library Beyond Walls patrons shared how critical outreach services are to their lives. Seniors praised the free mail delivery program, giving 5-star feedback, and an amateur astronomer was thrilled to borrow a telescope kit after downsizing from his home, now planning a stargazing event for fellow residents.

In Point Reyes, patrons celebrated becoming U.S. citizens through MCFL's pathways-to-citizenship support — a profound example of Library services fostering civic belonging.

At South Novato, a patron photographed the "Earth Teach Me to Remember" display and thanked staff for sharing words she said helped her "remember."

And in Stinson Beach, patrons eagerly awaited their refreshed Library, placing holds at Bolinas and sharing excitement about returning once the branch reopens.

Shaping the Narrative



The Event Newsletter and Library News Newsletter were delivered to patrons system-wide, offering updates on programs, services, and seasonal opportunities for engagement. These publications continue to strengthen the Library's connection with residents by showcasing stories that uplift cultural learning, community partnerships, and equitable access to information.


The team produced new visual materials supporting key initiatives and public-facing priorities, including graphics for Native American Heritage Month, CalFresh/SNAP awareness, Library Commission vacancy recruitment, and upcoming Library Refresh project notifications. These materials ensured that patrons received accessible, consistent information both online and in-branch, reinforcing our focus on transparency and community engagement during periods of service change.

In collaboration with Library leadership, communications also shared news with local media regarding the upcoming West Marin Bookmobile, supporting the public's early awareness of this major service enhancement. Internally, the team continued improving the design and clarity of the Commission Report, refining narrative flow and accessibility to better reflect our values and brand voice.

TECHNICAL SERVICES

Support Community Outreach

Technical Services supported frontline branches and community-focused initiatives through specialized outreach. Collection Development librarians conducted branch tabling sessions at the Inverness and Point Reyes libraries, creating direct opportunities for patrons to provide input on materials and services. The Digital Library expanded MCFL's role as a connector to essential resources by developing a new Food Insecurity Support webpage, helping residents access local food programs and assistance.

Technical Services contributed to countywide equity and organizational alignment through the participation of the Children & Teen Collection Development Librarian in the REA IT meeting, supporting MCFL's continued focus on anti-racism, equitable services, and collaborative learning.

Stabilizing Staffing

HR Gains Breathing Room and Finalizes Year-End Hiring

After nearly ten months of nonstop recruitment, our internal Human Resources team is finally experiencing a much-needed moment to focus and prepare to end the year keeping our vacancy rate consistently at eight percent. The past year has been defined by back-to-back postings, screenings, interviews, and onboarding cycles as we worked to stabilize staffing and respond to organizational needs. This pace required constant coordination, long hours, and unwavering dedication from the entire team. Now, with the heaviest surge behind us, we're able to pause, regroup, and refocus on strengthening our internal processes and supporting our existing staff with greater intention.

Even with this slight slowdown, our momentum continues. We are excited to share that two new employees are confirmed to join us this December, rounding out the year on a positive and productive note. Preparing for their arrival allows us to shift from rapid-cycle recruitment to more intentional onboarding—ensuring each new team member enters the organization with clarity, confidence, and a warm welcome. As we look ahead to the new year, this moment of balance gives our HR team the space to reflect, plan strategically, and continue building a supportive, people-centered workplace.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Measure B at Work!



We continue with the refreshing of our incredible community hubs – our 10 library branches across Marin County. So far, we're at the 30% mark of the project, with 3 of our branches completed in mid-December and continued preparation for all. Some of the improvements we'll be unveiling in December in West Marin are:

- New carpet at both the Point Reyes Library and Stinson Beach Library branches
- A splash of new color on the inside and outside of Point Reyes Library!
- Updated art gallery spaces in Point Reyes to continue to honor the amazing local artists we have here in Marin.
 (If you haven't seen the collections at Stinson Beach Library, I encourage you to take a trip. Their art gallery space is often booked months in advance.)
- Expanded Teen Area for Point Reyes Library and an increase in book collections for teens
- Updated furniture for both library branches that is functional and comfortable for the variety of community members we serve, as well as supports how people work and study from our library spaces today



During these closures, staff have been hard at work at organizing and clearing the clutter from our well-loved branches, as well as exploring and supporting staffing needs across other library branches. As we are committed to service 52 weeks a year, this is an incredible opportunity for our staff teams to connect on team and location goals and prepare to work from an updated environment for 2026.

Disaster Service Work in Response to Food Insecurity

In November, Library staff rallied in support in so many ways to support our community members to receive food during a pivotal moment when CalFresh benefits were abruptly removed. MCFL responded guickly in joining a County-coordinated

effort to supplement food support, including food drop-off efforts at all 10 of MCFL's branches. To date, we've collected 10 boxes of food for the community. Thank you to our library patrons for their support and donations! Library staff were also activated during this time as Disaster Service Workers and worked at food distribution sites in November. A tremendous round of applause and gratitude goes out to those staff members who signed up for distribution sites (sometimes more than once!), and all the staff who supported accepting food donations and coordination in our branches. That effort and heart in this work in service to our communities is to be celebrated and deeply appreciated.






DIRECTOR'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

Brenner called the meeting to order at 9:33 a.m.

- I. Determination of a Quorum Yes
- II. Public Comment Period None
- III. Business Topics
 - A. Approval of Minutes from Previous Meeting (*Action*) **Adlawan moved to approve the August 7, 2025, meeting minutes, Kenton seconded. Unanimously approved by a voice vote.**
 - B. MARINet Meeting Schedule (*Action*) **Duran moved to approve the MARINet Board FY 25-26 Meeting Schedule tentatively cancelling the January and April 2026 meetings, Gilbert seconded. Unanimously approved by a voice vote.**
 - C. Library Facilities Updates COM, MCFL, SAN, SRPL (*Discussion*) Several libraries will close for renovations in the coming months. Dates and services may shift, but current plans include:
 - San Rafael: Downtown reopened, opening celebration had over 1,000 people.
 Pickleweed will be closed late September through mid-October, with alternate services at Al Boro Community Center. Lockers are on order. Full reopening expected spring or summer 2026. MCFL Learning Bus will stop at Pickleweed.
 - San Anselmo: Temporary Mini Library opening mid-October in the Town Plaza, main library reopening late January 2026.
 - College of Marin Kentfield: Closing October 20 for relocation, reopening start of spring semester, January 2026. Indian Valley collection also unavailable during closure.
 - MCFL: 10 Branch Refresh Project underway, with staggered branch closures through June 2026. Updated timelines available on MCFL's Branch Refresh Page. Inverness completed.
 - D. Board Resolution CA State Library Grant (*Action*) The Board reviewed the MOU for the California State Library Grant. The contract was included in the packet and reviewed by Marin County Counsel. Counsel advised that MARINet request the arbitration venue

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be changed to Marin County and that insurance coverage be secured. Trenary will sign the MOU pending these adjustments. **Duran moved to authorize Trenary to sign the MOU for the California State Library Grant, contingent upon revision of the arbitration venue to Marin County and confirmation of required insurance coverage, Kenton seconded. Unanimously approved by a voice vote.**

E. Working Groups (*Discussion*) – Adlawan asked whether the working groups are meeting the Board's needs, noting that in prior years the Chair presented annual goals to the Board. Trenary emphasized that if the Board expects Chairs to present goals, Board Members must support their Chairs in this role. Trenary reported that all recommendations from the December 2023 *Streamlining MARINet Meetings* report have been implemented, including chair and note-taker rotations, scheduled meetings with agenda reminders, the merger of Children's and Teen Services into the Youth Services affinity group, and streamlined Board agenda processes. She further noted that the working groups are effectively meeting MARINet's needs and that staff may want to make greater use of their professional connections in the groups. The Board requested this item be added as an Action for the November meeting.

- F. AMH at MCFL Tech Services (Discussion) The Board reviewed the understandings outlined between MARINet and MCFL regarding the purchase, installation, and maintenance of an Automated Materials Handling (AMH) system at MCFL Technical Services. Of the \$500,000 originally allocated in 2021 for RFID conversion, \$231,529 remains and will be applied to this project. Under the agreement, MCFL will oversee procurement, daily operations, and maintenance, while MARINet will provide technical integration and purchase bins for the city and academic libraries. A Board Resolution will be brought forward once MCFL has purchased the AMH to authorize transfer of the funds.

G. Board Task Force Updates

 eBook (Action) - The Board reviewed the eBook Task Force proposal to reduce OverDrive holds and checkout limits from 25 to 15 starting November 1, 2025, with the goal of lowering wait times and improving access. Communication to patrons will take place in October, settings will be updated in November, and results will be evaluated in March 2026. Kenton moved to lower OverDrive holds and checkouts to 15, Duran seconded. Unanimously approved by a voice vote.

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- Equity (*Discussion*) The Equity Task Force completed its planned meetings with all MARINet working groups to introduce and gather feedback on the Commitment to Equity statement. Thanks to Lana for her participation and support. The Task Force will continue to gather input.
- Library Support Groups (*Discussion*) Paul Signorelli will facilitate a half-day interactive session on October 17, 2025 at the Belvedere Tiburon Library focused on collaboration, storytelling, and advocacy for Marin library support groups.
 The program will engage Library Friends and Foundation members in developing strategies for volunteer engagement, advocacy, and community support.
- H. CENIC Update from Stanley Han, Associate Vice President, Engagement, CENIC (Discussion) Han provided an overview of CENIC and its work with libraries, including updates on projects relevant to public libraries. He highlighted CENIC AIR, CENIC's artificial intelligence resource, and proposed a discussion with Tom DeFanti. Han will be meeting with California State Library. He also introduced C2TAG (CENIC Community Technology Affinity Group), which includes a mailing list, Slack channel, and regular meetings and webinars. Current discussions focus on security, the member portal, and future opportunities.

IV. Standing Agenda Items

- A. Library Advocacy (*Discussion*) Duran provided an update on California legislative priorities, including requests for one-time funding from the State Library for AI training and \$15 million from Proposition 4 to support public libraries as emergency centers for disaster response. She noted that eBook pricing disparities between consumer and library markets might be a legislative issue this year. Trenary reported that, although the State Library had announced the end of its New York Times subscription effective June 30, 2025, it has reversed course and will provide statewide access to the "Basic News" package from October 2025 through August 2026. MARINet will maintain its own "All Access" subscription, which includes cooking and other features, through June 30, 2026. The State Library will also continue the California Libraries Learn (CALL) grant program in FY 2025–26, with activities beginning September 29, 2025, and ongoing opportunities available through the CALL calendar and CALL Academy.
- B. Library Announcements (Discussion) -
 - Quffa (San Rafael) Hired three new librarians, with interviews underway for additional recruitment. A new marketing coordinator has joined Library and Recreation, and new promotional materials are in development.
 - Kenton (San Anselmo) Preparing for the library's relocation.
 - Gilbert (Dominican) Hosting a banned books read-a-thon, weekly "Little Penguin" story time on Fridays, and undertaking a library refresh.
 - Frye (College of Marin) Supporting current staffing changes and library move.

- Duran (Belvedere-Tiburon) Partnering with Reed Union School District on student library cards, collaborating with BAYREN on building sustainability initiatives, and planning physical collection shifts in December.
- Adlawan (MCFL) Continuing the 10 branch Refresh Project; Supervisor Colbert introduced a resolution in support of Banned Books Week.
- Brenner (Mill Valley) Conducting a public survey and hosting an after-hours event on artificial intelligence.
- C. Systems Administrator Report (*Discussion*) Trenary reported on completed 2025 projects including Auto Situs, the ticketing system, and student cards, with contingency planning and new notices still in progress. CENIC optimization project will be postponed in favor of the CENIC Firewall project. Recent highlights include a Sierra upgrade, improved school card workflows, SSL certificate savings, support for multiple library closures, and continued work on school catalog records, the annual audit, and upcoming NorCal IUG and BiblioCommons conferences.
